OMAHA WHOLESALE MARKETS. General Produce. Saturday, July 3. The following are the prices of the various round lots of produce as sold in this market. The quotations on fruits and other commodities shipped in from a distance are the prices of the market. Eggs.—The receipts are fairly liberal and fully equal to the demand. Stocks are moving for the most part at 11c. There are some heavy and stocks have to be moved quickly to prevent accumulations. There is very little of even the best quality of eggs at more than 12 1/2c. Full to good butter is selling at 20c. CHEESE.—Full cream cheddar, super, 9c; full cream flats, 10c; Young Americans, 11c; fancy Swiss, 9c; Swiss, imported, 5c; Limburger, 10c; brick, 13c to 16c. BUTTER.—All kinds in full supply. Old potatoes are going at 80c to \$1.00, according to quality. New potatoes at 30c to 35c per lb. GARDEN.—There is very little in season at the present time and while the weather is so warm it is not likely to be handled with a great deal of care. Flowering plants, such as carnations and geraniums, are moving at \$2.50 to \$3.00 with an occasional crop of fancy at \$3.50. Good spring chickens are sold at \$2.50 to \$3.00. There is no other kind of poultry coming in, at least not enough to make a market. EASTERN AND SOUTHERN FRUITS.—The supply of raspberries and blackberries is very limited. Blueberries are more plentiful. Strawberries about played out. Cherries scarce and not wanted. Apples from the south arriving mostly in bad condition; California stock more desirable.
