THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

Wheat Continues to Drag Along in the Slough of Despondency.

OLD WORLD CROPS VERY LARGE.

Strong Closings Recorded in Corn and Oats-Provisions Slow-Cattle Fairly Active-General Market Quotations.

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

CHICAGO, August 22.-|Special Telegram to the BEE. |-Wheat is still draggidg along in the slough of despond. It goes up a trifle one day and drops back the next, but the general average of prices is lower than it was sixty days ago, when the collapse of the "June deal" plunged trade into the depths of despair. The tenor of foreign advices is bearish. Old world crops of wheat are large and producing countries keep crowding for-ward supplies regardless of price. The friends of wheat are wondering if there will never be a turn to the lane. They figure that speculative money has suffered a loss during the last three years of 25 cents per annum on 50,000,000 bushels of wheat and 30 cents all told in the price, making the grand total of \$52,500,000, and now that the price is at or below the cost of production they are trying to guess when the inevitable reaction will set in. They think 69c for cash wheat would be a good starting point and they want to see quick action. This was one of the days when the price took an upward pitch of %c on a decrease of 771,000 bushels in the visible supply and a certainty that the returns would show that an enormous quantity of wheat had gone out of the country during the past seven days. The speculative demand was limited, however, and as the short sellers have also practically abandoned the market for the present, operations were on a restricted scale and fluctuations within narrow limits. September opened at 69c, ranged at 68%e low and 69%@69%e high, closing at 69%@69%c. October opened at 70%c, ranged at 70%@7ic, and closed at 70%c. December opened at 74%c, ranged at 73%c low and 74@74%c high, closing at 73%

Corn opened rather tamely at a shade Corn opened rather tainely at a shade lower prices than those ruling at the close of business Saturday. Strong buying by Poole, Kent & Co. and others turned the market up, however, May advancing from 44%c to 45%c, October from 41%c to 45%c, and September from 40%c to 40%c. "Old Hutch" seemed to be exerting himself to keep prices down without selling much, There was good general buying however, and after a reactionary season of weakness following the first advance values nowever, and after a reactionary season of weakness following the first advance values again took the up turn, May going to 45%c, October to 41%c and September to 41%c. The closings were at 45%c for May, 41%c for October and 41c for September, the several deliveries commanding full prices. After the tap of the bell the tone of the market averaged strong and private advises. market averaged strong and private advices again tend to support the theory that the damage to the crop in the drought region has at no stage been overestimated. The public is taking this view of the situation beyond a is taking this view of the situation beyond a doubt and the packers and their agents lean strongly the same way. The total visible supply is now only 6,102,000 bushels and local stocks are 2,168,000 bushels. In the speculative market for oats there was a pretty steady tone and closing prices were substantially the same for all months as Saturday.

In the provision pit the day was passed in a slow manner aside from a lew good large transactions in short ribs and lard, which are now selling at current prices for Septem-ber. The open cash trade was practically stagnant, while speculation was even more restricted than usual. September short ribs was the most active article on the list, and after selling from \$7.90 up to \$8.00 closed strong at 8@10c higher than Saturday. Lard strong at 8@10c higher than Saturday. Lard for September was a little stronger, ranging at \$6.42\cdot @6.47\cdot and resting at \$6.45\cdot which was an advance of 2\cdot c. October lard was 5@7\cdot c. ligher, and October short ribs 2\cdot @7\cdot c. lower than September. Winter deliveries were slow and unchanged, January closing at \$12.37\cdot for pork, \$6.62\cdot for lard, and \$6.35 for short ribs. NEW YORK, August 22 .- Special Telegram to the BER. |-STOCKS-Demoralization characterized the New York stock market, and the bulls, who have lacked organization for a month past, were in the worst plight that they have been in this summer. The impression is that the other business has taken a new turn, which necessitates a large amount of liquidation on the part of the several houses known to be heavily interested. There were also rumors of a big house being in trouble, but no names were mentioned. and the sensationalists were unable to make capital out of it. It was said that a powerful bear pool has recently been organized by the big traders in Newport, and that Gould had ecided not to oppose them. Cammack, Newcombs, Green & Bateman, Deacon White, and all the room traders sold the market freely. London was also a seller,

but it was one of those slumpy markets that had no support, and when fairly started on its downward course needed little hammering to keep it going. The Gould stock led the decline, Missouri Pacific breaking 2%, Kansas & Texas 34, Texas Pacific 134, Wabash 134 and Western Union 134 per cent. The rest of the list followed, and Northwestern, despite the increase of \$102,991 in its earnings during July, dropped 1% per cent and St. Paul broke 1% per cent. New England, which was the weakest sister last week, broke 1/4 per cent. The rest of the list went off 14 to 114 per cent. About noon a small rally occurred, but it appeared to be merely a natural one after a sharp break and did not hold. The closing hour witnessed an ex-pected change for the better throughout the list, and railies of 1/4 to 1 point occurred, and were due to covering by shorts. Last sales, however, showed a net decline from Saturday of 14 on Missouri Pacific, 114 on Wabash, 14 on Northern Pacific preferred, % on Western Union, % on Northwestern, % on St. Paul and Louisville & Nashville, & on New England, 1 on Lake Shore, 1% on Union Pacific, % on Omaha, 1% on Canada Southern and % per cent on Manhatan.
