THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

Transactions in Wheat of a Very Puzzling Nature.

A FAIR VOLUME OF BUSINESS.

Lively Trading in Corn With a Brisk Demand-A Bullish Day in Provisions Cattle Depressed-General Quotations.

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

Cuicago, Nov. 25 .- | Special Telegram to the Brg. - The wheat market to-day was something of a puzzle. News from winter wheat sections, which goes a long way toward controlling prices just now, was generally favorable to wheat and therefore bearish in nature, but wheat closed as high or higher on the morning session to-day than Wednesday. The almost universal reason given for this strength was sympathy with corn, thereby reversing the order of things established a few days ago, when the strength in corn was as universally attributed to sympathy with wheat. There was a fair volume of business done and a satisfactory portion of it came from the cutside. The opening and first sales were about 1/2 lower than the Wednesday closing, or at 75% of for December, 76% for January and 82% of for May. There was no sharp advance at any time, nor any considerable gain for the ses sion. December sold up to 76% @ 76% c. Jan uary to 77c and May to 83% c and at the 1 o'clock close December stood at 76% c, January at 76%c and May at 83% @83%c.

There was lively speculative trading in corn and the grain seemed to be wanted May, the most active delivery, sold up 11-pe from the opening prices and retained nearl all of the advance at the close of the morning session. There has been very heavy buying of this grain for a fortnight by a few oper ators, and it is estimated that holdings of these few, who appear to be acting in concert, must aggregate nearly 10,000,000 bushels. They are not selling any of it yet and when the men who sold it to them attempt to get it back they do not find the operation easy. Some of the larger lines of short corn were covered to day and this accounts in part for the sharp advance. The immediate situation moreover, is accounted to be in favor of holders. The present mild weather is infavorable for handling the new crop, bad roads are expected to follow the rain and farmers are confidently counted upon to hold back their deliveries, as usual on an advancing market. The opening here was at 44% a44% for for December, 44% for of January and 40% for May. These were the lowest prices of the session. At 50c for May corn there was an abundance of sellers and a slight halt in the upward movement, but when the possibility of corn selling above that figure was demonstrated there was less of the grain for sale. December sold up to 46c. January to 46% oc46% and May to 50% or 50%c. There was some reaction before the close at 1 o'clock, when December rested at 45%c bid, January at 46c and May at 50%c.

Oats for future delivery sympathized closely with the upward movement in corn and to clock figures showed a net gain for the regular session of %c. A couple of local houses were free buyers of May and there were also a good many buying orders from outside, probably to cover shorts. After a rather easy opening, starting sales of May being at 31½c, the market touched 31½c and then advanced, with but few reactions, to 32¼c. At 1 o'clock 31¾632c was bid. De-

cember improved from 1754c early to 284c and closed at that.

In provisions the trade was decidedly bullish in its tendency. The advance in hogs, coupled with a material appreciation in corn, made the movement strongly upward. The bear interest was in fact unable to exert any direct influence, and as compared with Wednesday's closings, 1 o'clock quotations showed an advance of 373ge on pork, 73g@12c on lard and 15c on short ribs.

The weather was wet and dreary, the pens floating in mud. There are no fixed values and prices on plain and common stock are about as low as in July last-the lowest for 1887 so far. The few cars of prime steers and good and useful stock that arrives from day to day sell about at the same prices as last week, but there are only a few of this description. Perhaps eight or ten loads would cover all there has been on the market the past two days. Native butchers stock is down again to low water mark. There are a large num-ber of buyers for stockers and feeders prescnt, but they are going slow, waiting for bottom prices.
