DAILY BEE. A RELAPSE AND COLLAPSE.

Isaac Weil's Bankrupt Store Made So in Fact.

A FATAL RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

Sam Anderson Killed While Trying to Board an Engine-Stealing Sand -Cupid's Captures-A Fireman Remembered.

The Weil Failure.

Yesterday morning the "Bankrupt stock" of clothing, etc., at No. 506 Broadway was taken possession of by the sheriff and the doors closed. On inquiry the following facts were developed: For thirty-one years past Isaac Weil had conducted an immense retail clothing business, having houses at St. Joseph and Kansas City, Mo. About a year ago he was forced by the tide of adversity to make an assignment. The failure was for \$429,000. He settled with his local creditors at 70 cents, and with his outside creditors at 40 cents on the dollar. In order to continue business and realize as much as possible from his assets he secured backers to his paper in the persons of J. and N. Lorlie. He was to make his payments in four installments. The first one of \$40,000 was paid last August. The second one is not yet due, but finding it impossible to meet these payments when due, he made a full assignment on Tuesday.

Soon after the first break a portion of the St. Joe stock was shipped here and another lot to Clay Center, Kan. These stores were conducted by sons of Mr. Weil, Benjamin F. being assigned to the Council Bluffs store.

Mr. Weil has attempted to bridge over his present difficulties by instituting small commercial loans. One was made by Officer & Pusey a short time ago to the amount of \$2,000, another was made by Benjamin F. Weil for \$1,368. When these loans were made it was expressly stipulated that in case of difficulty these parties should be amply protected, and as security chattel mortgages were given on the stock here. Tuesday evening last Officer & Pusey were notified by Weil of the impending crash, and yesterday morning at 8 o'clock the mortgage of Benjamin F. Weil was filed for oreclosure, and ten minutes later Officer & Pusey followed. The first was made subject to the latter and the stock was taken possession of on Officer & Pusey's mortgage. Within a short time the claims of other creditors appeared. Seligman, May & Co., of New York, \$4,000, and Morris, Newburger & Co., of Philadelphia, \$4,000. These claims, with many other which are expected to appear, are against the original stock and vere covered by the first settlement. Everything the Weil's possess is being taken by their creditors to satisfy their

It is a significant fact that for years not a single failure has occurred among the merchants who have been in business long enough to establish themselves and become identified with the business and interests of the city. There have been several failures, it is true, but they have been, without an exception, similar to this of Weil. Becoming embarassed elsewhere, and find-ing moving a necessity, they have come here. Another loud-speaking fact is that these persons, like Weil, have gen-erally done well on their local business and made some money, and had they not been embarassed before coming here failure would not have followed. Council Bluffs has a good, reliable pur-chasing public. This is the testimony of the merchants. No important line of business is overdone, which is evidenced by general prosperity in all departments of trade. This city is willing to father its own reputation and in all points of advantage compare with the world.

A sad accident occurred about 7 o'clock yesterday morning at the Chicago & Northwestern crossing on Fifth avenue by which Samuel A. Anderson lost his life. Just how it happened no one knows, but it is supposed that he attempted to step upon the front of the switch engine and ride down to his work as he was in the habit of doing, and slipped on the icy ties. The body was discovered by a brother-in-law of the deceased shortly after the accident. and was removed to the undertaking rooms of Morgan, Keller & Co. The engine carried the unfortunate man over one hundred feet, and the wheels passed directly over him, completely cutting him in two. The fireman was oiling the valves at the time, and the victim was on his side of the track. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental death, but did not attach any blame to the railroad company or em-ployes. The jury consisted of S. B. Heft, H. Hertman and W. L. Walker.

The deceased leaves a wife and three children, one of whom is adopted, being the daughter of John Sandusky, who was killed by the cars about two years ago. The family reside at 1108 Avenue B, but are not left without support, as the deceased was insured for \$1,000 in a New York company, and they will also receive a benefit from the Switchmen's and Masonic Aid associations, to both of which he belonged. A brother, J. Q. Anderson, arrived last night from Oskaloosa, where he is agent of the narrow gauge. A telegram was received from the father of the deceased, stating that he would arrive to-day from Pella, Ia. The deceased was forty-two years of age, and has long been a faithful and trusted employe of the Chicago & Northwestern company, and had charge of all the passenger switching. He was a sober, industrious citizen, and his loss will be felt among a large circle of sincere friends. The funeral will take place at 2 o'clock to-morrow afternoon, and will be attended by Excelsior Lodge, No. 250, A. F. & A. M., and the local branch


