[FROM THE BER'S LINCOLN BUREAU.] Governor Thayer yesterday issued the following proclamation 'declaring the city of South Omaha a city of the second class:

South Omaha a city of the second class:
Section 2, chapter 14, page 199, compiled statutes of Nebraska, 1887, is as follows:
Section 2. (Proclamation of governor). Whenever any city shall hereafter have attained a population of 5,000 inhabitants, and such fact shall have been fully ascertained and certified by the mayor of such city to the governor, the governor shall by proclamation declare such city to be a city of the second class and subject to the provisions of an act to provide for the organization, government and powers of cities of the second-class having more than five thousand and less than twenty-five thousand inhabitants.

And, whereas, a certificate has this day been filed in the executive office by the mayor of the city of South Omaha, in the state of Nebraska, in which it is certified that the said city of South Omaha contains a population of more than 5,000 inhabitants; the said certificate having been given by the mayor acting under instruction from the city council of said city, and in accordance with the facts and with the requirements of the law as above set forth.

Therefore, I, John M. Thayer, governor of the state of Nebraska, do hereby issue my proclamation and declare the said city of South Omaha a city of the second class, and subject to all the provisions of laws providing for and governing such cities. In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set

THE COUNTY OF PRIKINS. Governor Thayer yesterday issued the fol-lowing proclamation organizing the county of Perkins:

Whereas it has been certified to me by G.
L. Laws, secretary of state, that on the 6th
day of November, A. D. 1887, the majority of
the electors of the county of Keith, at a general election then duly held, voted to form a area election then duly herd, voted to form a new county out of said county of Keith, to be known as Perkins county, comprising that part of Keith county, bound and described as commencing at the southwest corner of town-ship nine (9) north, range forty-one (41) west, of the 6th P. M., thence east to the south-east corner of township nine (9) north, of range thirty-five (35) west, thence north to the north-east corner of section twenty-four (24) in township twelve (12) north, of range thirty-five (35) west, thence west on section lines to the northwest corner of section nineteen (19), in township twelve (12) north of range forty-one (41), thence south along the state line to the southwest corner of township nine (9) north, of range forty-one (41) west, and thence east to the place of beginning.

And it further appearing that said new county of Perkins contains a population of not less than two hundred inhabitants and

not less than two hundred inhabitants and not less than four hundred square miles of territory, and ten or more of its resident tax payers have petitioned for the organization of said new county and location of county sest.

Now, therefore, I, John M. Thayer, governor of the state of Nebraska, by virtue of the authority in me vested by the statutes of the state of Nebraska, in such case made and provided, do hereby order that on Tuesday, the 17th day of January, A. D., 1888, there be held in said county of Perkins, a special election for the election of county officers, and for the location of the county seat; and I do further order that such election be held in the several election precincts of said county at the last and usual place of voting, as said county has at this time been subdivided into election precincts, by the county commissioners of Keith county of which it formed a part.

And there being no power vested in me by law for the appointment of county officers in such case, it is ordered that the county cherk of Keith county, give the proper notices of such election, and that returns of said election be made to the county clerk of said county of Keith, and canvass by him made as
