The American Jews.

New York Sun: In their Annual for 1888, the number of Jews in the United States is put at 400,000, a total that seems small when we consider that they are scattered throughout the union and finance. The vast majority of them, too, have been added to our population within the last generation, the number of Jewish congregations having in-creased from fitty-six in 1850 to 350 in 1887, with a membership of more 20,000

Yet the Jews began to settle in New York as early as 1649, and by the middle of the next century they had estab-lished themselves in Newport, in Philadelphia and in Charleston and Savannah though they were nowhere welcomed by the other colonists, Maryland granted religious liberty to christians only; Pennsylvania required that all of the offices of the colony should be filled by professed christians; the New Ehgland colonies, and New Jersey, the Carolinas and Georgia made church attendance compulsory. Delaware made belief in the Trinity requisite to holding public office, and New York re-fused to the Jew the privilege of voting for colonial representatives. But after the passage in Virginia in 1875 of Jefferson's famous "act to establish relig-ious freedom," the Jews began to enjoy liberty of conscience, though even as election to office of any Jew, and Maryland sentenced a Jew for for having spoken disrespectfully of Jesus. In New Hampshire, too, up to 1877, all state offi-cers were required to be Protestants. Our authority for these facts is Rabbi Joseph Krauskopf, who writes in the Jews' Annual, and who finally refers to the order of General Grant 1863, expelling all Jews from his military department, as "the most noted act of intolerance against the Jews." The same author gives a history of the progress of Jewish reform in the United States, by reason of which American Judaism has become a distinct religion, as compaired with Judaism elsewhere. That reform culminated adoption by a conference of rabbis at Pittsburg in 1885 of a declaration of principles in which only the moral laws of the

views and habits of our modern civilizaviews and habits of our modern civiliza-tion." The Mosaic and rabbinical laws regulating diet and priestly purity and dress were set down among those "altogether foreign to our present mental and spiritual state;" and the "Messianic hope" of the Jews was de-scribed as not the re-establishment of the ancient Jewish state under a son of David, and the renewed separation from the nations, but "the establishment of the nations, but "the establishment of the kingdom of truth, justice and peace among all men." The immortality of the soul was affirmed, but both the resurrection of the body and everlasting punishment were rejected as "ideas not cooted in Judaism.'

This annual also reports that the Sabbath schools and confirmation classes have increased by 10 per cent during the last year; that the establishment of new congregations is "almost of daily occurrence;" that there is a growing demand for rabbis of academic training; and that the many temples, schools, charitable asylums and club houses built and building show the high moral and religious development of the race. Semitic departments have been added to Columbia college, the University of Pennsylvania and Johns Hopkins university; and though the Hebrew Union college, or theological school, will grad-uate no students in 1888, it expects to graduate ten in 1889. It seems that at the beginning of this year a rival theological seminary was started here by the more orthodox Israelites, who obtained aid from the Portuguese congre-gations of New York and Philadelphia, with the view of combatting the prog-ress of reformed Judaism; but the Annual has no faith in its continued existence as an orthodox rabbinical insti-tute, since "no orthodox institution holds out long among American Is-

raclites.'
As to the movement to bring about the observance of Sunday as the Sab-bath it has amounted to nothing according to this authority, which tells us that "the Jew may be a Sabbath; breaker, but never a Sabbath-changer for he never changes a genuine article for a counterfeit." The attempts at proselyting the Jews it also speaks of as oolish and hopeless. If the Israelite ever changes, it says, with truth, he becomes an agnostic and not a christian.

Finally, the Annual gives a list of more than two hundred Jews who hold, or have held, public office in the United States, though, of course it is by no means complete. Among public officers elected at the last election in this city were six Jews-Theodore W. Myers. comptroller; Jacob A. Cantor, senator; Joseph Blumenthal, assemblyman; Philip Benjamin, alderman; and Henry M. Goldfegle and Samson Lachman civil justices.
