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SUFFERERS FROM HERYOUSNESS Lank

W. J. GALBRAITH,

CURED BY A MISTAKE. Diphtheria Patient's Remarkable and Saving Error.

Cincinnati Times-Star: It is not gencrally known that the recent recovery of Miss Lydia Jordan from diphtheria was the result of a fortunate accident. Outside of a few, the family and a few friends, the serious condition of the young lady was not generally known. Miss Jordan is one of the most popu

lar young women in Walnut Hills society, and it is said that she will shortly marry a young Avondale man. About two weeks ago she went to see a friend who was sick with diphtheria, and, unthinkingly, sat in the room for over an hour. In a few days she began to show symptoms of the disease and it soon developed that she had it in its

most virulent form.

The family physician, Dr. Disney, began to lose hope, so strong a hold had the disease taken upon her system. Miss Jordan kept getting worse and worse, until finally the doctor found to his utter consternation that a false membrane was forming in her throat. This is regarded as the worst possible form of the disease, and one which is abso-

lutely incurable.

The rapid growth of the membrane was attended with increased difficulty in breathing. It was gradually closing the air passage. The doctors informed Mr. and Mrs. Jordan that the struggle was over, and that the disease had tri-

The unhappyparents were almost wild with grief. The girl had been an es-pecial favoritite with them on account of her handsome face and sunny disposition. It hardly seemed real to them that she could be lying on her deathbed, with her young life slowly fleeing

away with each laborious breath.

The doctor said that in a few hours all would be over.. Already the membrane had grown over the throat, so

that only a hole the size of a large needle remained. The girl was lying with her head thrown back. The veins in her forehead were swollen terribly and her face was flery red. The mouth was wide open and out from the throat came a horrible half-rattling, halfwhistling sound. In every curve of her form, in the fearful clutching of he fingers, one could read the agony she was

enduring. Dr. Disney nad been very fond of Miss Lydia, and seeing that nothing more could be done he left a phial of medi-cine "to be used when the breathing had about stopped," and started away. fully expected never to see the girl again until she lay in the coffin with the whiteness of death in her features. The medicine was some simple restorative that might compel the soul to fret a little longer in the body, but could never

do any good.

The medicine was placed on a small table near the bed among a lot of other phials of similar size and shape. The father and mother sat close by the bed-side of their dying child. Soon the sound of the breathing grew louder and harsher. The writhing of the frame showed that the end was very near. Mrs. Jordan started up, took from the

phial the doctor had left, and measuring out a dose, poured it quickly down her daughter's throat. The effect was instantaneous and horrible. The girl writhed as she had not done before. Her finger nails tore into her flesh. The veins fairly leaped from her skin. Her face grew black, and her wide staring eyes fairly started from their sockets. No scream issued from the writhing lips. It was the per-

table what she thought was the last

sonification of mute agony. This only lasted for a minute. Suddenly there was a sharp, cracking sound. The girl's body lifted itself from the bed. There was a terrible from the bed. gasp, a groan, and then a fit of micking coughing. The swollen veins began to side, the black color of the face changed to a dull red, the eyes slowly closed, and the girl began to breathe

again. While this was happening and the girl was at the very height of her suffer-ing, the mother looked at the bottle whose contents had produced this ter-rible effect. To her horror she discovered that, by mistake, she had given the girl a large dose of aqua ammonia, a sufficient quantity to have suffocated

a well person. The doctor was immediately sent for and when he arrived was told what had been done. To his astonishment he found the girl resting easy and looking far better than she had for a week. Her lips and the lining of her mouth were burned by the ammonia, as her throat must have been also. An examination' into Miss Jordan's condition shows that, although she was very weak, yet her throat was comparatively clear and there

was every indication of certain recov-On the cover, in front of her, the doctor found the false membrane which had been the cause of all the trouble, and which the girl had ejected in that last paroxism. So singular in appearance was it that at first the doctor could not believe it had been torn from her

throat. It was a hard, elastic, rubber-like lump of flesh, of a sickly white color, cylindrical in shape, three inches long, and about half an inch in diameter. Through the center of it ran a hole, barelo large enough for the insertion of a knitting needle. It was by means of this hole that she had been able to breathe, and the gradual closing of it had brought her so near death. Dr. Disney took it to his office and has preerved in alcohol.

Taken altogether the case is a most curious one. In the first place, although the ammonia was the only thing that could possibly have saved Miss Jordan's life, yet no physician would have been justified in prescribing it. A fortunate accident was fated to accomplish that which the imperfect medical art could not do. The false membrane itself is the only

one of the ki..d known in the history of medicine. It is large in size and pecu-liar in shape. The rapid formation of it is a puzzle to the physician.



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
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
