VERY LARGE RECEIPTS OF CORN.

Oats Dull and Featureless-A Dull Day in Provisions, With No Outside Trading-Brisk Business in Live Stock.

CHICAGO, March 12 .- | Special Telegram to the BEE. ]-The wheat market to-day broke over the limits which have held it now for nearly a month. For once the expectation of a majority of local traders was realized and the market, which opened &c lower than Saturday's 'close, immediately declined still further. The government report, with its 10,000,000 bushels more wheat in farmers' hands than at this time last year was the last momentous straw of the load which the bulls were carrying, and with Sunday intervening in which to think it over it appeared that a considerable number of them were willing to let go this morning. . However, there was no very heavy trading and at the decline "the market was well sustained. The shorts did a good share of buying, plenty of them being found on this, as on all previous down turns, quite willing to take their profits on May deals whenever that delivery fell below 80c. May wheat opened at 80%@80%c and after selling at 80% c straight, sold down to 79%c, reacted to 80c, then fell to 79% c and after another slight reaction to 79%(@79%c, which was the lowest point. Then there was another advance to 80c, and during the latter part of the session the price held between 79%c and 79%c, closing at 1 p. m. at 79%@79%c. The heavy receipts of corn were too much for that market, and another decline was scored there. The trading was not heavy. The grain was not without friends, however, and whenever the pressure was relieved the market seemed spring back and fluctuations were lively.
