SCALPERS DO THE CORN TRADING

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

CHICAGO, March 26 .- [Special Telegram to the BEE.]-The one strong bullish influence in the wheat market to-day was the decrease of \$11,000 bushels in the visible supply. It was not that the decrease was very large, but it was more than half a million bushels greater than was expected. In addition to this was the increased number of crop damage reports consequent upon the re cent cold weather. The opening prices were We higher than Saturday's close and at one time there was even a considerable advance from that standpoint, but when this happened the big bears began to sell some and talk more as a decided intimation that they were not yet out of the market. There was some buying by the country to-day, chiefly from the winter wheat belt, but it was not large, Boyd, Paxton & Boyd were strong buyers, but otherwise the scalping element did most of the trading. There was moderate buying, both of futures and of cash grain for foreign account. May wheat opened at 76%c, sold up early to 77c, fell back to 76%c, advanced to 77%c soon after the visible supply statement was made public, then worked back to 70% and closed at 1 o'clock at 76% @ 76% c. June wheat opened at 77% c. sold down to 77% c, up to 77% c and closed at 1 o'clock at 77% c, up to 77% and closed at 1 o'clock at 77% c.
