

THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

Wheat's Visible Supply Decrease a Strong Bull Influence.

SCALPERS DO THE CORN TRADING

Provisions Open Weak and in a Feverish Condition—Business in Cattle Fairly Active—Hogs Lower

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

CHICAGO, March 26.—[Special Telegram to the Bee.]—The one strong bullish influence in the wheat market today was the decrease of 811,000 bushels in the visible supply.

It was not until the decrease was more than half a million bushels greater than was expected. In addition to this was the increased number of crop damage reports consequent upon the recent cold weather.

Speculative trading in corn was largely of a scalping nature, but it was lively nevertheless. Moderate trading in the market was prospective, and the railroad strike were the strengthening features, and the short interest here is not as concentrated and powerful as in wheat.

There was a more active speculative trade in oats and the market was stronger. May oats opened at 30 1/2c, closed at 30 3/4c; 30 1/2c closing at 30c, and sold up to 30 1/2c.
