National Encampment. This important annual event in Grand Army circles occurs at Columbus in the second week of September next. The present indications are that it will be the largest encampment ever held, it being estimated that about 300,000 veterans will be in attendance. The extent of the preparation is indicated by one of the camps, which is arranged to accommodate 30,000 men.
