CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET. CHICAGO, June 5 .- [Special Telegram to THE BEE.]-The feature of to-day's wheat market was the heavy purchasing of August by Jones, Kennett & Hopkins. It was so effective as to put the two deliveries of August and July at practically the same price. Moreover, just before the close, when brokers who had been buying largely of August gave up the name of the above firm as their principals, it caused a little flurry among the smaller shorts who put prices up nearly 1/6e in their attempts to cover. This made the close of the morning session quite strong at nearly the highest prices touched. Yesterday was a holiday for the Chicago market but the other markets had been doing business and had depressed prices so much that the opening here this morning was 4c or so below Saturday's close and there was even a slight decline from this; but it was reported that exporters had taken forty loads of wheat in New York yesterday and the increased clearances served to strengthen the idea that at last foreigners were wanting American wheat. This also served to strengthen the courage of believers in wheat and there was fair buying-good enough to advance prices %c. Then Jones, Kennett & Hopkins sold July and every local trader who had some of that delivery appeared to who had some of that delivery appeared to want to sell it and the price sagged slowly 3/5, only to recover within the last few minutes as above written. The magnitude of the purchases of August wheat by the firm named above led the crowd to put them down as buyers for the bull party for to-day at least and even that portion of the crowd who can "see no good in wheat" have a wholesome respect for the powers of the present bull party. One side or the other will probably get the most powerful help from government crop reports, which should from government crop reports, which should be out next Saturday, unless, indeed, it should show no change in the condition of winter wheat, in which case it would doubt-less be without effect. It is awaited with considerable anxiety. July wheat opened at solid earlier at 84%c, then gradually advanced to 84%c and gradually fell to 84%c advanced to 84%c and closed there at 1 o'clock. December wheat opened at 85%c, sold up to 86%c and closed at 1 o'clock at 86c. The corn market suffered to-day from a too abundant supply. The arrivals for two days were 1,455 cars, of which 717 cars were of contract grade and the estimate for to-morrow's receipts is 600 cars. NEW YORK, June 5.—[Special Telegram to THE BEE.]—STOCKS—The feature of the stock market was its weakness and a shrink in St. Paul preferred, which dropped 314 points before 2 o'clock, and sold to 103%. Common went off 1% in sympathy and touched 64%. There were all sorts of rumors in circulation affecting the stock. There was said to be strong probability of a new issue of preferred stock to help the company out. Another report was that it had increased its mileage 900 miles the past year and its indebtedness \$33,000,000, and that the earnings decreased \$200,000. The long stock came out freely, one of the directors being reported a seller. The weakness spread to the rest of the list, and although slight advances were recorded on a few of the active stocks at the opening they gradually sagged off, and declines of 14 @1 point were recorded. Pullman and New England, however, were exceptions; the former advanced 214, and the latter 36, but did not hold it. The Burington report for April, showing a net decrease of \$755,000, was generally anticipated, and the stock only broke 14. There are two circulars out on Reading. One is issued by Corbin. It says there is no floating debt, and the company has \$10,000,000 in addition to the \$10,-003,080 4s received for bettorments. The second circular offers new \$24,687,000 4s to the public at 87%. Ten per cent is payable on subscription, 10 per cent on alletment, and 67% per cent June 25.
