#### CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

CHICAGO, June 8 .- [Special Telegram to THE BEE. |- The wheat market was particularly dull this morning. Everybody was waiting for the government crop report which will doubtless come to-morrow and is expected to give the market a strong impetus in one direction or the other. It is the uncertainty as to which direction that will be that was responsible for the duliness of the morning session. The range of fluctuations was fairly wide, but it was upon a small volume of business and the changes appeared to be caused wholly by rumors of what the government crop report would be. As to these rumors there was a wide variety, for one of them, which came by way of New York, said the report would make the average condition 69 as against 76 last month. It was sufficient to put the price up to the highest point of the day, but was evidently discredited later, as after the shorts had covered, the improvement in the price was lost. Another report, upon which there was some buying, was that 69 loads had been taken for export in New York to-day, but it was afterward discovered the message read "6 to 9 loads." The similarity of the figures made some believe that all the reports named had the same source. Another rumor coming from Washington said the government report would show a considerable improvement, but did not pretend to give figures. This rumor seemed to have less effect than the other. But these were the only influences of the day. The range of prices was generally lower, but at the close of the morning session the decline established was only about 14c from yesterday's close. The weakness in corn had more effect than would have been the case if the latter mar-ket had been broader. July wheat opened at ket had been broader. July wheat opened at 85%c, fell immediately to 85%c, then advanced to 85%c, declined to 84%c, improved to 85%c again and declined to 85%c, which was the price at the close. December wheat opened at 86%c, sold up to 86%c, down to 85%c, and closed at 86%c.

It was a bear day in corn. The opening was at %c under last night's close and after a slight reaction there was a decline of wearly

slight reaction there was a decline of nearly as much more. Large receipts for to-day and large estimates for to-morrow seemed to be large estimates for to-morrow seemed to be the only cause for the decline. There was no great raid made as would be short sellers expect that a sudden falling off in receipts might at any time prove disastrous to them. The strength shown yesterday morning, when receipts for once fell under the estimates, showed very clearly what might happen if the burden of arrivals should be lessened. Unfavorable forcing should be lessened. Unfavorable foreign news added to the weakness there. July corn opened at 53½c, sold early at 53½c, then up to 53½c, down to 52½6a55c, advanced to 53½c and closed at 1 o'clock at 53½c. September corn opened at 54c, advanced to 54%c, fell to 53%c, and closed with that price

The speculative oats market was quiet with a slightly downward tendency, influenced by large receipts and by the weakness in corn. July oats opened at 33¼c, sold at 33¼@24½c, down to 33c and closed at 33@ 33%c. September oats opened and closed at 27%c, selling down at one time to 27%c. In provisions the late dullness was con-

tinued. In all branches of the trade business was far from satisfactory, and as there was some disposition to sell, induced by the decline in hogs, an easier feeling held control. Prices favored buyers, and at 1 o'clock pork showed a falling off, as compared with last night's closing, of 12½c, lard of 7½c/210c and short ribs of 7½c.
