THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

A Bearish Sentiment Gains Ground in the Wheat Pit.

THE GOVERNMENT CROP REPORT.

Conflicting Interpretations of its Real Import-Corn Still Weak Under Heavy Receipts-Oats Depressed-Cattle Slow.

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

CHICAGO, June 11.-[Special Telegram to THE BEE. |-The wheat traders changed their minds three times on Saturday as to the effect which the government crop report ought to have on the price of wheat. This enabled them to hold four different opinions and put prices up and down with a very lively motion. Their last opinion that day was that the government report was a very bullish document and pointed toward much higher prices. In pursuance of this thought the market closed firm at the top and the bulls and holders of wheat generally went home happy. All this bright outlook was changed over Sunday, not from any fresh news received, but simply from further figuring and more extended reflection upon Mr. Dodge's estimates. It was claimed with great confidence by the bears that this was a bearish document, the reason given being that it was no worse than the May report and upon said May report prices had been advanced unduly. With a fair crop in Europe, as was now promised, importing countries, it was claimed, would be practically independent of America, and it was admitted that, with a crop of 400,000,000 bushels, there would be enough for us to cat with some over, and that small surplus if nobody wanted it, the bears insisted, would set low-prices, for the whole crop. On this kind of reasoning there appeared to be considerable offering by short sellers and with no great demand from the outside to put prices up many longs were anxious to unload. The result was a decline of about le from Saturday's closing prices. They were few other things besides bear crop talk to depress the market. Cables were no lower, and as the first figures for the visible supply statement came in they indicated a very slight decrease, if any. The completed statement showed a decrease of 670,000 bushels and being fully 500,000 bushels more than was expected early it was thought would produce a firmer feeling. It did for a short time, but the improvementswas only temporary and the close of the morning session was very near the bottom and at about the prices ruling Saturday before the crop report came. July wheat opened at \$5% and on the filling of early buying orders, advanced to \$6% 60% c, then declined, with small reactions, to \$5c, advanced to \$5% c on the visible supply statement, then declined to 85@85%c, which was the price at the 1 o'clock close. December wheat opened at 85c, sold at 87%c, down to 86%c, and closed at 1 o'clock at 86%c.

The pressure of enormous receipts of corn

is still on the speculative market in that grain, and produces the inevitable result of lower prices. To this was added to day the weakening effect of an increase in the visible supply of corn of 1.855,000 bushels. These continued heavy receipts wear out the These continued heavy receipts wear out the patience of holders and bring out some long corn every day, and the demand from the shorts, who are realizing profits, and from investors, who think the run of big receipts must soon cease, is not sufficient to sustain prices. July opened at 52c, and after selling at 51½cc, fluctuated between that price and 51½c sometime and closed at 53½c. September corn opened at 53c, sold at 53½c, then declined to the close, which was at 52½c bid.

Unexpectedly large receipts of oats.

Unexpectedly large receipts of oats, together with crop news of a favorable character, exercised a depressing influence upon the speculative oats market, and the lecline in corn was a weakening factor. Trade, however, was not large. June oats declined from 32½c, which was Saturday's close, to 32½c, and closed at 32½@32½c. July oats opened at 32½c, fell to 32½c, but closed at 32¾c. September oats opened and closed at 27%c, selling at one time

In provisions the week opened without any improvement in business. A dull feeling had control and trading was limited and featureless and the movement favored easier prices. The day's market averaged lower than Saturday and at 1 o'clock perk showed a decline of 10@15c, laru of 234@734c and short ribs of 236@5c.

Good to choice dry corn-fed steers, especially light and handy classes, held their own and, although easier to buy than on Fri day or Saturday, were not materially lower But undesirable weights or quality sold some what irregular and substantially lower. There was a large per cent of green and grassy natives among the arrivals last week This class sold fairly well. They were not then discriminated against, but to-day no one seemed to want them. Salesmen that had good to fair sorts of grassers could not get bids for them, and here it might be stated that from this time until the close of the Texan and western season the shipper that sends green grassy cattle to this market stands ten chances to one of losing money for the simple reason that green natives will have to sell right alongside of rangers and when it comes to that the buyer will take the Texan or ranger every time for the good reason that pound for pound when dressed, the ranger is worth the most money to butchers. The ranger will shrink less and makes a better show on the hooks. Let the shipper remember that there are ten chances to one against him of getting out when he ships green steers unless he car afford to sell them at ranger or Texan prices. Keep it in mind, Mr. Shipper. There were 4,000 to 5,000 Texans on sale, the best selling the same as last week and common grades going a shade lower. Fine, fat native calves and heifers were in fair demand and steady. Bulls and native canning stock were about down to low water mark. Dealers in stock down to low water mark.
