MORE COMPLAINTS ARE FILED.

Several Nebraskans Seek Relief From Railroad Extortion.

A RAILWAY TRANSFER RECORDED.

Incorporation of the Nebraska Mercantile Company of Kearney-New Notaries Commissioned Yesterday.

The railroad companies of Nebraska continue to eatch it. Clerk Waring today filed complaints from Palisade. Sutton and Tekamah, which allege grievances, disobedience and extertion, and pray the interposition of the state board of transportation. The people of the state have certainly come to the conclusion that they will no longer suffer robbery without rigorous protest, and they strike right where there seems to be a prospect for speedy redress. While complaints come before the board over which it has no jurisdiction, the state becomes aware that grievances exist that ought to have equitable remedy, and the statement and agitation of them can not help but do good and ultimately result in fruitful adjust-

W. E. Brickey, of Palisade, a small town near Culbertson, Hitchcock county, writes the board of transportation that the B. & M. railroad company purchased the right of way, and graded a line of road from Culbertson to Holyoke, Colo., and through the inducements of the road and the Lincoln land company, a great many business men were induced to invest their means in town property along the line under construction and to engage in business. The promise of the railroad fluctuated the value of property, and the failure to finish the construction resulted in great loss to all who invested in town property, and to those who located in the tributary country settlements. Brickey further states that the Burlington is holding the grade to bide their own good time in completing it, and to keep out competing roads, and that they have been eminently successful in doing it. This he claims is clearly unjust to his people, and to the people all along the line, and he asks the state board to help them in the matter. Answer was sent to Palisade to-day, simply stating that the question of dress was beyond the j jurispressing sympathy for the unfortunate and unjust situation.

The village of Nelson, Nuckois

county, filed an affidavit, setting forth that an ordinance was passed on the 3rd day of October, 1887, by the village council, establishing a street grade that R. Hellingsworth, the village clerk, served a notice on the Burlington that such an ordinance had been created, and that the right of way of the road touching the streets did not confom to it; that the street approaching the depot was narrow, and that it was dangerous for footmen or travelers to go to or to come from the depot at train time; that the ordinance was being enforced and that the road was given thirty days from the 18th day of June to comply with the requirements of the ordinance. Mr. Hollingsworth writes that the

road deliberately disobeys the order of the village council. The board of transportation to-day served notice on the road touching the matter, as is the custom whenever complaints are supported by affidavit. The third complaint filed to-day came

from Messrs, Wilson & Sutherland hardware merchants of Tekamah, but they tell their own tale as follows:

"TEKAMAH, Neb.. July 16.-We wish to call your attention to what we consider an extortion or highway robbery. practiced by the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha railroad company. The published tariff rate of the road on gasoline is 25 cents per hundred pounds. Now, can the road bill a barrel of oil at 400 pounds that does not weigh more than 300 pounds and charge us \$1 freight. Our distance from Omaha is forty-three miles. Can they collect on excess of the actual weight? We are handling oil in barrels quite extensively and this excessive freight runs into quite an amount. Would we be justified in tendering the company this published rate on actual weight and refuse to accept goods unless accepted?

"WILSON & SUTHERLAND." AN IMPORTANT RAILWAY CONVEYANCE On the 8th of June, 1888, the Northeastern Nebraska railroad company sold and conveyed its railroad to the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha railway company, to the mutual satisfaction of all parties to the sale and

Secretary Laws to-day received the deed of sale and conveyance, which was duly filed. With it came resolutions ratifying the sale and purchase, which were also made a matter of record.

The resolutions of the Northeastern company recite that the sale of the road by the board of directors meets with the approval of every stock holder, as well as every act on the part of the board that led to the sale. The capital stock of the company consisted of 1,000 shares, valued at \$100 each. M. Hughett, president of the company, owned 993 of the shares, and E. W. Winter, E. E. Wood-man, H. S. Jaynes, S. L. Perrin, J. H. Howe and J. M. Whitman,

Edwin E. Woodman, secretary of the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha railroad company, certified that the purchase of the road was authorized by the board of directors, and that the purchase was ratified at the annual meeting of the stockholders, held at Henderson, Wis., on the 9th day of June, 1888, and that the papers of ratification were signed by over two-thirds of the mem-

The consideration of this conveyance was \$257,740.27. A NEW MERCANTILE CORPANY.

These gentlemen associated themselves in usiness on that date and organized the Nebraska Mercantile company, with an authorized capital of \$50,000, and fixed upon the 27th day of July, 1888, as the date upon which to commence business, and the same day of the same month of 1988 as the time to conclude, unless fate or a majority of the company etherwise decided in the interim. The object of the company is to buy and sell merchandise and chattels generally, and do a general real estate business. The company will endeavor to hold such real estate in the corporate name as shall be necessary to transact the business of the company. In 1761 Illustrious Brether Stephen Morin was commissioned deputy inspector general by the grand Orient of France to spread the rite in St. Demingo, the West Indies and America. In 1766 Hiustrious Brother Prince America. In 1600 mustrious brother Frince de Rokan, governor of the island of St. Do-mingo, and one of the signers of Illustrious Brother Stephen Morin's patent, furnished evidence to the grand crient of France of the unmasonic conduct of Stephen Morin, result-ing in Stephen Morin's patent being revoked and he recalled. In 1783 Stephen Morin, in disregard of the revocation or annulling of is patent, and powers and his recall in 1761, yent on constituting chapters and councils in

different places and erecting in Charleston, S. C., a Lodge of Perfection. In 1801 John Mitchell, Dr. Dateko, A. Al-exander, J. Alid and E. De la Motta, of the irregularly constituted Charleston Lodge of Perfection, under advice of Stephen Morin, onstituted themselves a Supreme Council of Dr. Dalcho, as grand commander, and John Mitchell and A. Alexander, learning of the irregularity of their organization, backed by abundant proof from the Grand Orient of France, disbanded, and refused to allow the use of their names to further operations, and there was nothing further heard from this illegal body until it was resurrected by Illustrious Brother Albert Pike in 1859 and 1869. This so-called southern jurisdiction under Pike, claims jurisdiction over the states south of the Ohio and west of the Mississian steer.

ippi river. In 1507 a grand consistory was established in New York by virtue of patents emanating from the Grand Orient of France and issued to Illustrious Brother Cerneau, the regularly commissioned deputy inspector general of the Grand Orient of France, and notice thereof, with copies of the patent under which it and he was created, was duly sent to all the supreme masonic bodies of the world, which was followed by the most imple recognitions which have never been

withdrawn, May 25, 1812, the Supreme Council of Sovereign Inspectors General of the 33° for the United States of America, its territories and dependencies, was opened in New York, with Joseph Cerneau as sovereign grand commander, and De Witt Chaton as deputy grand commander, and a full set of other officers. As to the pretended expulsion of Joseph Cerneau by E. De La Motta, one of the followers of Stephen Morin, the supreme council of France says in its proceedings, year 1818, page 60, of the Extract du Livre D'Or: In response to the promulgated de-cree of E. De La Motta, wherein he aniounces the expuision of Joseph Cerneau, w find in reply thereto the following, viz "Nevertheless, the illustrious brother Joseph Cerneau is a sovereign grand inspector gen cral of the 33 → degree, this last and sublime grade having been conferred upon him legit imately, he being gifted with powers emanating from the supreme council for France." [Translation]. On the 15th of August, 1824, the Marauis De Lafayette landed in New York, was received as the nation's guest, and during the year was exalted by the Su preme Grand Council for the United States of America, its territories and dependencies, to the 33° and last degree of masonry, and was elected as sovereign grand commander, which position he occupied during his sojourn in the United States, and when about to return to France he resigned and Illustrious Brother Governor De Witt Clinton was re-elected to to fill the vacancy, and General Latayette was elected as the representative of this Supreme Council of America to the Supreme Council of France, and he was received and acknowledged by the Grand Orient of France as such and occupied the position until his death. This United States jurisdiction, its territories and dependencies, had a legitimate beginning with a regular line of succession to the present time, and the organization in Nebraska has ample evidence to substantiate every claim made.

Let us look at the so-called southern juris

diction under Brother Pike. it began illegally in Charleston, S. C., in 1801, and died a few years later, slept until 1859 or 1860, when again brought to life by Brother Pike. Brother Albert Pike says in his Transactions, 1878, page 19: "We have no record of the transactions at Charleston from 1801 to 1800. There is nothing to show what the supreme council did from its birth to 1860. I do not know when I was elected a member or when grand commander." On page 20 he states: "The truth is that the rite was nothing and the rituals almost naught, for the most part a lot of worthless trash until 1855." On page 30 he states: "Twelve years ago (1866) we had no foreign "Twelve years ago (1866) we had no foreign correspondence of any value, and no foreign power considered us entitled to respect. To most of them our very existence was unknown, and with those who knew us our opinions would have had no weight." In Brother Pike's Transactions, 1882, appendix, page 7, he states: "In 1855 we had no foreign correspondence, and no Masonic power in the world cared for our opinion, or was so ocor as to pay us reverence." On pages 5 and 6 he states: "The supreme council had a treasurer general and no treasury. I do not suppose that Brother Le Prince, who was called that Brother Le Prince, who was called treasurer general, ever in his life received or paid out a dollar of the moneys of the supreme council. He kept no books, the secretary general kept none, and whatever came into his hands for degrees was his. If any bodies had made returns for twenty years back I could not find them. There were no records [1859]. The supreme council had not printed a volume or even a pamphlet of its own, nor any property of any kind to the value of a dollar, nor credit enough to buy a book." On the 28th day of March, 1859, upon a call from me (Brother Pike) the supreme council met at Charleston. There were present (three) Brothers Mackey, Le Prince and myself. At this meeting we (three) enacted a law increasing the membership of the supreme council to thirty-three, apportioned among the states of the jurisdiction; and we (three)

which has recently been organized in Ne-braska as a branch of the sovereign body, is braska as a branch of the sovereign body, is not a new one except in Nebraska. It has a continuous record direct from the Grand Orient of France (which was a legitlante body at that time) from 1807 to the present time, and it proposes to occapy all the territory included in the United States, irrespective of any lilegal body so existing. 



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
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
