Uncle Sam About to Take a Hand in Prohibition.

THE DAY'S SPORT AT MANAWA.

Furnishing of the Government Building-Going Through a Policeman's Trunk-A Wabash Judgment-The Council-Bluffs Notes.

Fresh Trouble For Saloons. It is now reported that Uncle Sam is about to take a hand in the prohibition

game. As is generally known, the government makes it decidedly warm for anyone selling liquor without the requisite license. On the other hand, the present state law provides that the fact that a man has a government license to sell liquor is prima facie evidence that he is engaged in selling liquor. A government liquor license is, therefore, a rather awkward bit of paper. A saloon man who does not possess it is liable to fall into the unyielding clutches of Uncle Sam, and if he does possess it, the great state of lowa, by its prohibition attorneys, seizes upon it as one of the best proofs of a violation of the law. There has been a good deal of dodging about to prevent trouble on this account. Nearly everybody dreads Uncle Sam's wrath more than the prosecution under the state law, for while the penalty may not be so severe, it is more

certain to come.

In order to dodge both it has been quite customary to take out the needed governtment license, and lay it to one side, in a drawer, or other convenient place, where it can be readily reached for and shown up. if necessary, and yet be hidden from the sharp eyes of the prohibition informers.

Unfortunately the United States revenue law provides that this license must be posted in a conspicuous place. Here is where the pinch is to come. Those who hide their government licenses are lable to a penalty, and if they are fined for this, that produces the needed proof by which the prohibitionists will proceed under the state law. It understood that a government officer will soon "round up" some of these offenders. The local officials of the government have not been very vigilant in hunting up instances of the violation of this regiment to post the government license in a conspicuous place. They probably are not very en-thusiastic prohibitionists, and do not care to aid in getting evidence against the saloon. If Uncle Sam begins to force those who sell liquor to post their licenses, it will be difficult to keep the prohibitionists from thus getting the evidence by which to make out state cases. An official is expected here within a few days for this purpose.

Couldn't Stand the Bluff.

The evening democratic paper, after being repeatedly asked to produce the many affidavits showing that the saloon men had been bribing the prosecuting attorney of the law and order league, at last shows its hand. There are three of a kind. The affidavits are quite wordy, and when sifted, it appears that Mr. Hardy, of Avoca, made a settlement of some cases brought against Avoca saloonists, among them, one named Jensen. A careful reading of the three affidavits fails to show that anyone received a dollar from Mr. Jensen except Mr. Hardy, to whom it is averred that \$150 was paid by Jensen. As Hardy represented the law and order league of Avoca, and had full charge of its business there, it seems that if any one is to explain the settlement made with Jensen, it should be Mr. Hardy.

The affidavits do not refute the claim that Avoca's law and order league started war against six saloons there and employed Mr. Sims as their attorney. Mr. Hardy seems to have made his own negotiations, while Mr. Sims conducted the cases in court under his direction, dismissing such as the law and order league, by its representative, Hardy, requested dismissed. The affidavits go to substantiate the statement that Mr. Hardy made the settlements and received the money for the costs and attorney fees. So long as no witness yet appears who claims that Mr. Sims ever received a dollar to which he was not legally entitled, that gentleman seems to have little or nothing more to deny. The affidavits are, as was supposed, wholly lacking in substantiating the charge that Mr. Sims received single dollar from Jensen, and it is not to be wondered at that the Globe was so slow in producing them. It was so evidently ashamed of their weakness that it would never have produced them if it was not that it could not stand the bluff.

The well known "Palace restaurant," 406 Broadway, has passed into the hands of Mr. John Allen, and by him been entirely renovated and refitted. His rooms will be in the northeast corner. United States Marshal Campbell will have his office in the northeast corner. The next term of the United States court for the southern district of Iowa, which convenes on the 24th of September, will be held in the beautiful court room on the second floor. The principal work that yet remains to be done is putting in the elevator. Bids for this work were advertised for six weeks ago, but nothing has yet been heard regarding the letting of the contract.

The Old Wabash Debts.

THE DAILY BEE. MUST SHOW THEIR LICENSES evening. The object of his visit was to levy an execution on the interest of the Wabash railroad company in the Union elevator in this city. On the 7th of October, 1886, the United States Trust company, of New York, obtained a judgment in the United States court for the southern district of Iowa, against the Omaha division of the Wabash rail-road for \$2,699,218.50. The Omaha division was sold to satisfy the judgment, for \$1,400,000, leaving a deficiency of \$1,299,218.60. The Union elevator was not built until after the judgment was obtained, and the Wabash company refused to allow their interest in that structure to be sold to satisfy any part of the judgment. The Trust company brought suit and Judge Shiras decided that it must be sold, being governed by the same law that would apply to depots built after a judgment was secured. This decision was rendered at the last term of court. The Wabash owns a sixth interest in the elevator, amounting to \$46,666.66, representing the cash paid for the construction of this \$280,000 elevator. It will now be sold within thirty days and will probably be bid in by the Trust company for about \$25,000.


