Memorials of Political Benefactors.

Robert Weidmann is the proud benefactor of several campaign memorials of other days, among which are one of the old log cabin days. This is a medal on one side of which is a cabin with the date 1840, and on the reverse "the choice of the people." On the reverse is a medal of Major General W. W. Harrison, with the date of his birth, February 9, 1773. Another medal is that of the campaign of General Scott and Franklin Pierce. The third memento is one of the campaign of 1840, between Henry Clay and Franklin Pierce. These are rare novelties, and are greatly appreciated.
