WHY THE NAMES WERE POSTED.

The Intention Was to Remind Delinquents of Their Obligations and Not to Cast Ridicule Upon Them.

There are two sides to all controversies and, appreciating this fact, THE BEE representative this morning modestly knocked at the parsonage door of St. Theresa church, and asked for a brief audience with Bishop Bonacum. "Not at home," said the lady who auswered the summons, "but walk in; you will find Mr. Dunphy or Father Lawrence in the parlor.'

Nothing loth, the hospitable invitation was accepted, and kindly greetings with these gentlemen were soon exchanged.

"I believe that you gentlemen were joined in the injunction suit with Bishop Bonacum by Mr. Egan, were you "Yes, sir," they answered pleasantly,

"we were." "Can you consistently furnish THE BEE with a strtement of your version of the matter, and if so, how did you re-

ceive the service?" "The service upon us," said Mr. Dunphy, "was a great surprise, and we don't know what to make of it."

"But what about Mr. Egan's subscrib-

ing \$500 to the church building fund, and refusing to pay it? "Last spring, when the building of the addition to our church was under consideration, Mr. Egan subscribed \$500 to the fund, one-fifth of it to be paid on demand and the balance every two months, in equal payments, or all of it on or before the 1st of January. But

to pay his subscription. This subscription was made conditional upon kind treatment and continued church fellowship in good standing,

"No, sir; no conditions of any were made or implied, ow this to be true. kind Why, Mr. Egan was made one of the building committee, a position he accepted and retains to this day. There could have been no reason for condi-

tions at that time."
"What about Mr. Egan's name being posted upon the walls of the church among other delinquent subscribers and his indebtedness being spoken of publicly from the altar?"

"There is really nothing in that. While it is true that a number of names were written upon a bulletin, with the amount of their subscriptions set opposite them, and hung up in the church at the entrance door, it was simply done as a reminder of their obligations, and to show the liberality of the denors, and not to throw any one into ridicule or contempt. Once or twice when the contractors

had finished certain portions of their work on the new addition, the bishop suggested the fact to all who had subscribed to the building fund and were debtors, but in no way singled out Mr. Egan or any one else. This he did from the altar, but in the customary way, and no one else took umbrage, and there were good men who were due on their subscription. The statement is not true that threats have been made that Mr. Egan's good name will be paore the public as one who can not or will not pay his debts."

"Were you present at the meeting of the National Irish league in this city?" Yes, sir; and I opposed the rescript resolution favored by Mr. Egan, and not Bishop Bonacum, as stated. If the bishop had anything to say against it he was very mild in his opposition. I moved to table the resolution and opposed its passage, not because Mr. Egan favored it, but because I believed it to be wrong and that it ought to be defeated. You can put it down that Mr. Egan subscribed \$500 for the building fund, but prescribed its payment upon no conditions, and to my knowledge he has not refused to pay his subscription. The bishop has treated him kindly; he has not published his indebtedness or sought in any way to bring him into ridicule or contempt. Indeed, he is kind to all of his flock and very considerate and has made no threats that his name will be published in con-nection with his church debt."

"Father St. Lawrence, have you anything to add to what Mr. Dunphy has "No, sir; only I think that my being

The Beatrice board of trade fathers the railroad wails and protests against a reduction of freight tariffs. The following resolutions were passed at a meeting of the board last evening, and are forwarded for the consideration of the state board of transportation:

"Whereas, The state board of transporta-tion has demanded of the rairoads of Ne-braska a further reduction of freight rates, amounting to nearly 15 per cent from the reduced tariffs mutually agreed upon by the state board and the railroads in November

"Whereas, We believe such constant pressure upon the resources of the roads is exercising a most harmful influence elsewhere and is depreciating railroad values and placing an effectual stop upon railway extensions by existing corporations and upon the construction of projected new lines, be it

"Resolved, That we respectfully and earnestly request the state board to recall their recent order and, for the present, permit the tariffs to remain unchanged; that we believe western capital will not decline its aid in the future development of our state if our authorities continue a policy so depressing in its effect upon railway securities; that inasmuch as there has been no demand whatever, much as there has been no demand whatever, on the part of the people, for additional concessions we fail to see any necessity for insisting that such shall be made; that we believe that if these still lower rates are to remain operative we must anticipate the withdrawal of many of the freight and passenger facilities we now possess, through the enforced economy the roads will be compelled to practice in order to secure adequate forced economy the roads will be compel-led to practice in order to secure adequate returns; that we are convinced that for their joint prosperity, the state and the railroads are mutually dependent and that to cripple and harass an agency so powerful in hasten-ing the onward progress of our common-wealth and the welfare and happiness of its people, is a policy we cannot too heartly con-demn and which, if insisted on at this time,

The cat being a great pet Mr. Lewis Pieffer took it in his arms to take it to the house so it would not get hurt with the reaper. The cat bit Mr. Lewis Pieffer in the face, inflicting quite a wound, and had to be choked off. The cat afterward whipped off three large dogs, as it is presumed the dogs became alarmed through their instinct at knowing the cat was rabid.
