THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

A Substantial Improvement Witnessed in the Wheat Pit.

CONTINUED ACTIVITY IN CORN.

Oats Still on the Advance-Provision Dealers Frightened By Yellow Fever Reports-Cattle and Hogs Dull-Quotations.

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

CHICAGO, August 15 .- [Special Telegram to THE BEE. |-The wheat market averaged higher to day, most of the business being done at better prices by 14c and over than yesterday's closing range. Weather news from the northwest is not favorable and cables were firm-some of them strong. The crowd was in a mood to bull this morning and the tendency to improvement met with very little resistance. Hutchinson was credited with good buying throughout the session on soft spots, and limited offerings were taken whenever the pressure was applied. The sentiment seems to be changing to some extent. The stalwart bulls, who comprise the exporting houses and the majority of the veterans in the trade-"oldtimers," as they are called-have never wavered in their faith, but the more mercurial scalping and room-trading element is shifting to the front apparently. The movement of wheat is attracting attention. The receipts at primary markets are not excessive for the season, and the quality does not improve as was hoped. On the other hand shipments continue liberal and cautious pears are disposed to wait before extending risks and see whether or not the wheat that is drifting eastward will go into store at tidewater or go right through. If the latter they will cease their scoffing. As a class they are listening with increasing patience to the statements that are made about short crops in the new and old worlds and admit that the bulls have something tangible to base their hopes on of higher prices ultimately. The exporting houses are doing nothing to advance the mar-kets, but they are very busy people these days just the same. September wheat started at 82 c, advanced to 82 c, broke 3c on a bearish cable from a London stock-house, bulged again to 83c on the covering of a considerable line for Bloom. Then followed a reaction of 3cm34c and a recovery to within 3cc of the best figures of the day, where the market closed. December ranged \$43cd \$55% c and closed at 85%. This market held the advances easily and recovered quickly from the breaks. The firmness of tone manifested was in striking contrast to the prevailing weak-ness of the past two or three days. The improvement in prices, as compared with yesterday, was 3/2/3/c. The accepted theory of the corn market to-day was that Hutchinof the corn market to-day was that Hutchinson couldn't make it go the way he wanted to, that he was heavily long and couldn't get rid of his holdings. He had no trouble in bidding up prices whenever he felt like it, but when he came to unloading down went the market. A good many of the little fellows were scared in around the top, but the fighters and heavyweights stood by their guns and contested the ground nervily. The opening range was 44%c for September and 44%c for October. The market was bid up 34c, but it worked down to 44%c for September and 44%c for October. The price averaged from that range to 44%c better throughout the remainder of the session and throughout the remainder of the session and closed practically at the bottom and 3400340 lower than yesterday. The crowd was buck-ing Hutchinson from the beginning to the end. The receipts are clearly falling off, and as the shorts are yet far from covered the bulls do not concede that the improvements just scored will not be held or that a further gain may not be established. A lively trade was transacted. The corn pit was crowded

most of the session.

In oats, the improvement noted yesterday was continued, with fair speculative interest manifested and a further slight advance, especially in seller the month. Receipts were only moderate, and there was little or no improvement in inspection. The weather was cloudy and wet and unfavorable for harvesting, and the shorts were taking some near futures. August sold up %c to 25 4c, but reacted somewhat, with other months 1/2 1/4c better than yesterday's closings. The trad-ing in cash lots was largely by sample, although there were a few transactions in No. in store at 24%c, or about %c advance. In the provision pit a "sick" market was

experienced. Lard was quite well supported by the English houses interested, but in short ribs and pork the movement was bearish from the start. In the two last named lines there was an almost general desire to realize. The rumors of yellow fever in Memphis, coupled with fears that the scourge would spread throughout the south despite the quarantine and other precautions, made speculative holders of product anxious to unload. English houses, while holding lard, were also free sellers of pork and short ribs. The buying throughout the day proved discovered the sellers of pork and short ribs. appointing. When pork for September de-livery dropped under \$13.25 and short ribs under \$7.90 there was some covering by shorts but the new business transacted was of small proportions. Outside orders were insignificant and in addition to being "sick," the market was slow and quiet. In pork the day's prices covered a range of 20@25c; in lard of 5@10c, and in short ribs of 17%@20c.

One sale of fancy steers sold as high as \$6.60, but these sales are very exceptional, aside from this one, \$5.35 being the outside for good steers for shipping purposes. The market closed dull with a large number left over. FINANCIAL.

NEW YORK, August 15 .- [Special Telegran to THE BEE.]-STOCKS-The backset the bulls received yesterday made them less confident after the business of the day was over, and there was not so much talk of higher prices at the usual places of resort last night. To-day the market was generally quiet and rather uninteresting, opening steady at slightly irregular changes from last night's close. After the first few minutes the tone improved throughout the list. with the exception of Missouri Pacific, which declined a half-point. London houses received many buying orders in the first hour, and higher cables gave confidence to buyers. There were some selling orders in Reading, some buying orders in Louisville & Nashville, and some covering of shorts put out yesterday. The loss in Missouri Pacific was quickly recovered, and other active stocks dvanced gradually under the lead of New England. There were few selling orders in the market after the first part of the session, and an attempt by the shorts to cover in Western Union and Missouri Pacific caused them to advance half a point, the general list continuing to improve and moving up slightly.

Richmond Terminal became the feature of the market slong toward noon and advanced a point on heavy buying. The entire day was featureless. Outside orders were scarce and trading, being largely professional, had no significance. To-day, for the first time, there were indications of some short stock being put out by heavy bears. The close was tolerably firm at fractional advances which were quite general, ranging from 14 to 1 point. The total sales for the day were

TRADE CONDITIONS.

General trade is very healthy and collec-tions are good. There is a general feeling that trade will be larger this year than last, despite the fact that politics are monopolizing o much attention.

The Bank of England has raised the rate of discount to 3 per cent—an indication that the return flow of gold to this country is o be checked as much as possible, but with he abundant crops in sight here and the threatened scarcity in Europe the balance of trade must largely preponderate in our favor

and be settled in coin The foreign trade returns of the port of New York for July, as published by the Com-mercial Bulletin of that city, disclose an in-crease in importations and a falling off in exports compared with last year. In the item of specie the imports last month were \$1,957, 841 less than during July, 1887, but the move ment of merchandise was greater by \$2,849,-145, leaving a net increase of \$891,304. Per contra, the outward movement of treasure was \$3,208,461 in excess of last year, whereas the exports of merchandise show a falling off of no less than \$5,050,825, leaving a net decrease of \$1,842,364. Compared with July, 1887, the differences in the merchandisc movement are even more striking. Thus an increase is shown of \$2.27,782 in the entries of foreign products, while the merchandise exports were smaller by \$6,800,779. A significant feature of last month's returns, says the Bulletin, is that, despite the alleged ob-
