THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

Lively Boom Experienced in the Wheat Pit.

NERVOUSNESS CAUSED IN CORN.

Light Trading in Oats-Unusual Interest in Provisions-Cattle Slow and Weak-Hogs Active.

### CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

Cutcago, Oct. 25 - Special Telegram to THE BEE. |-The wheat market experienced quite a little boom to-day, and most of the advance was held, the story of the day differing in that respect from yesterday. The market was strong "from the jump." The official quotations made the opening \$1114 for December and \$1. 8 for May, but as a matter of fact, opening prices for May extended over a range of 11c, or from \$1.13 to \$1.14%. The strength displayed was a great surprise to the majority of the operators. The weak closing of yesterday produced the impression that prices were likely to go still lower, and the crowd was inclined to take a radical view in that general direction. All of which goes to show that there is no way of judging to a certainty which way the cat is going to jump. The market had its back arched, though, most of the session. December ranged at \$1.14@1.16 and May \$1.10@ 1.16%. December was at a premium of 340 over May for a while, but the two months were on a par or close together nearly all the time. The vast preponderance of trade was in May, but there was enough going on in December to show that there was life in the deal and a large open interest in that delivery. May reached \$1.15% the first time a little before 12 o'clock, and reacted from that point to about \$1. 5. It recovered Mc and hung around \$1.15% @1.15% for a brief period, but at a quarter before 1 o'clock the register indicated \$1.16, from which figure there was a reaction of 14c, followed by a season of steadmess. The price of Decem-ber was \$1.15% when May touched \$1.17% first, but on the subsequent rally both months were \$1.16 simultaneously. The close was strong at \$1.15% for December and \$1.15% @1.15% for May. The volume of business was large. The public does not seem to be taking a very important share in the proceedings, but the Northwest and every proceedings, but the Northwest and every considerable commercial center piled in or-ders with more or less freedom. Domestic market news was generally builtsh. That from the Northwest was especially so; in-deed the Northwest was the principal lever under the market. One of the first bits of news set afloat was the announcement that receipts at 242 country elevators in Minneota and Dakota aggregated only 31,000 bush els yesterday. For several days farmers' de liveries of spring wheat have been failing off but this is the sharpest break yet and is commonly accepted as indicative of a decided and speedy falling off in receipts at Duluth and Minneapolis. Receipts at winter wheat centres are

also letting down in a marked degree, and there is a promise of a continuance of the light movement, although in Michigan the grain seems to be freely in motion. This falling off in the movement from first hands loes not mean necessarily that there is no wheat in the country, but it shows that the flush of forced delivery which usually ex-tends through the first quarter or third of a crop year is over, both as regards spring and winter wheat and the same is said to be true of European deliveries. The effect of this in this country was to cause prices to that the market having passed through a season of the greatest pressure in the course of values is now naturally upward. The bulls have not been so full of spirits for two or three weeks and they are hopefully setting their eyes upon a




