## LINCOLN NEWS AND GOSSIP.

One Horse Fatally and Another Seriously Burned.

SUPREME AND DISTRICT COURTS.

Incorporation of the Perkins County Bank-New Notaries Commisstoned-General and Personal Matters of Interest.

LINCOLN BUREAU OF THE OMARA BEE, 1 1029 P STREET, LINCOLN, Nov. 30.

The fire alarm sounded just before noon to day, and shortly afterward the clatter of boofs and lingle of the fire engine announced that a rapid run was the order for the scene, located on the corner of Twenty-fourth and O streets, a little over a mile from the government building. When the fire was discovered it was apparent that it had got under too much headway to save the building, a small barn, and the alarm was turned on to save other buildings located near. This the fire department succeeded in doing. Aid, the fire department succeeded in doing. Aid, however, did not reach the scene in time to save two horses that were tied in the bara. One of them was fatally burned. The other was badly scratched about the head and neck, and may die from the injuries sustained. Besides the horses a quantity of hay and some agricultural maghinery were consumed. The loss is estimated at from \$600 to \$500. There was no insurance. The owner, Mr. C. R. Lengue, is a poor man and can ill-afford the loss.

The blaze was caused by a bonfire built by a small boy, too near the building. Instead of giving the alarm when he saw that the fire was getting beyond his control, he ran from the place and sought to hide, evidently badly frightened; boylike, he did not have the presence of mind to run to the house for assistance, and consequently a valuable horse

assistance, and consequently a valuable horse perished in the flames and another one was badly burned. It was a sad accident.
THE PERKINS COUNTY BANK.

While the action of the court this morning does not dispose of the case, the street railway element regard it a point in its favor, and it is stated has strong hopes of uniunately accomplishing its aims. Whether the motor company will agree to commence the construction of the remaining section of their work and operate jointly has as yet been undecided, but it is generally thought that it will succumb to this source of adjusting the difficulty.

The demurrer in the case of McConnell against Simpson et al., in an action to recover judgment of \$8,659 was sustained. Simpson is the defaulting extreasurer of Oloc county, this state, who is now confined in the penitentiary for misappropriation of public moneys.




