THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

Wheat Weak and Considerably Lower Than Yesterday.

CORN DULL AND UNCHANGED.

Provisions Retrograding - Cattle Ruled Unusually Stow-Hog Receipts Will be About 23,000 Less Than Last Week.

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

CRICAGO, Dec. S .- [Special Telegram to THE BEE. |- This was a dull and weak Saturday in the wheat market. The range of prices was 1%c, and the average was considerably below that of yesterday. The during the first hour. At \$1.00% there was good buying, and during the middle part of the session the price ranged at \$1.00% (6) 1.09%. About 12:30 o'clock a break occurred which carried the market down to \$1.05% The scalping sentiment was bearish, and the crowd in the pit worried the market down, which they had little trouble in doing, on account of the light volume of trade. The narket recovered fractionnily, but in the last fifteen minutes it sold off again to \$1.05%, with a trade or two at \$1.08 (001.08); The close was \$1.08%. January opened at \$1.04%. ranged at \$1.04%@1.03% and closed at \$1.03% As compared with yesterday, this shows a shrinkage of 34c. The grain trade has its eyes turned on the northwest. The bulls up there promised several weeks ago that the receipts were going to fall off rapidly in the near future, and every week they have insisted that a few days more would witness a sharp letting down in the movement. Yet the receipts at Minneapolis have kept right up. For a while the explanation that the receipts represented the grain that had accumulated on side-tracks, was accepted as satisfactory. When that became stale the information was youchsafed that the wheat coming forward was from the country elevators, and was being moved nearer the basis of the flour supply where it could be kept under closer personal supervision. To day somebody had it, that the high prices ruling in Minneapolis were attracting wheat from northern Nebraska and Iowa. In contradiction of this report came reliable advices from Iowa and Nebraska of small supplies of wheat in those sections. The shipment of quite a iot, on milling orders, to a point west of Davenport was reported by the commission merchants, 14 per cent of the freight being paid from Chicago westward. The small millers throughout northern Indiana and Illinois throughout northern Indiana and Illinois are beginning to buy a little wheat here, as usual at this season. The aggregate of this business is small, but it tends to show that values are not wholly speculative, though it is probably true that wheat here could not be ground into flour at the present prices and sold at a profit, in considerable quantities. The foreign situation is strong, according to the latest mail and telegraphic advices, and the export shipments are discouragingly small, but this circumare discouragingly small, but this circumstance is not allowed to disturb the serenity of the bulls. The visible supply is expected to show an increase of from 750,000 to 1,000,000 bushels this week, and thereafter to show very slight further increase, unless indeed. the flour market should be supplied from invisible reserves, and warehouse stocks keep on growing, as some think probable. The volume of trade was small to-day. About the only excitement shown was when Ken-nett was selling the market down from \$1.0992 to \$10.312. The week closes bare and a shade lower than on last Saturday, with

the situation not materially altered.

The corn market was dull almost to stagnation, but prices were a shade higher during the greater part of the day, than they closed yesterday. January opened at 35%c, and May at 37%c, which was %c better in both cases than last quotations on Friday. Inspection returns showed only 17 cars of contract corn in to-day's receipts, while the weather was mild, but the atmosphere was heavy, and rain threatened at this point. The Liverpool market was quoted dull and lower, but there were moderate export clearances noted from the Atlantic ports, and five boat loads were bought for shipment in New York, to-day. Fluctuations were narrow and the day's business uninteresting and duli. The de-mand for each corn in store was slack and at lower prices than prevailed yesterday. The closing prices were \$560351cc for January, and \$7%c for May, which is about where they started in the morning, but they ruled fractionally biguer than those figures during fractionally higher than those figures during the greater part of the day, and only dropped back a few minutes from the close, influenced apparently by the weak closing of the wheat market. Charters to day were for 150,000 bushels at 4%c freight to Buffalo. Cattle have been late arriving each day on account of the railroads undertaking to weigh stock in transit, so as to increase their freight rates Cattle arriving late in the day had to be held over night, and with the increased receipts each day it was impossible to make a clearance since Tuesday.
