About a dozen Omaha policemen visited the Bluffs yesterday afternoon to see what their brother policemen on this side of the Muddy were doing, as well as to take a ride on the electric cars. They took in the entire city, and returned to Nebraska soil in the evening.

No business was transacted in the district court yesterday. Court opened in the morning as usual, but an adjournment was taken until this morning. The case of Charles Bull, for the larceny of a coat, belonging to R. S. Richardson, from the Methodist church, is set for trial this morning.

Council Bluffs merchants never made a more attractive holiday display than this season. There is no need of going far from home to select suitable gifts for this year. There is some complaint among certain classes of merchants because the weather is too fine, and trade is backward, but on the whole business is good, and there is a general smile in business circles.
