BAXTER RETIRED. Another Union Pacific Office Has

Been Abolished. Assistant General Manager Cuming, of the Union Pacific's cowboy territory, has notified Robert Baxter, assistant superintendent of the Wyoming division of that road, that on March I his office will be abolished, and that his services are no longer desired in Cuming's department. The announcement of this step was made known to intimate friends of Mr. Baxter, at headquarters in this city. It is thought that Baxter will be tendered a position on the Baldwin. No other assistant division super intendent has been rumored aside from Bax-ter by the man from Harvard. It is stated that it is next to an impossibility for one man to attend to the duties devolving upon the de-partment of superintendent of the Wyoming division, and that the department of assist ant will be revived as soon as the removal of Baxter blows over.

A New Transfer Track. . The Union Pacific has commenced the con-

struction of a transfer track at Thirteenth and Nicholas streets in order to make con nection with the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha at that point. Under the present arrangements, the transfer is made in the yards at the foot of Dodge street. As soon as the new connection is completed the officials of the former road state that it will require 75 per cent less time in transferring cars to the Omaha road.

Conflicting Statements.

General Freight Agent Miller, of the Burlington, announces that his road has not, as yet, inaugurated the 22-cent rate from points south of the Piatte to Duluth, but that such a movement is anticipated. However, the statement that traffle is being solicited by the Burlington at that rate at the present time is made by good authority, and Harry Miller, a well-known grain dealer, says the rate was put into effect Tuesday.

An Excellent Appointment.

Mr. P. E. Robinson, widely known in railroad circles, has been appointed contracting freight agent for the Blue Line fast freight company, with headquarters at Omaha. Mr. Robinson was at one time assistant general passenger agent of the T., E. & M. V. railroad, and later held a prominent position with the Union Pacific. He has had years of training in the railway service, and his capa-bilities peculiarly fit him for the duties be

Time by Electricity. Superintendent of Telegraph Korty, of the Union Pacific, has completed arrangements for a new system of "distributing time" to all points on the Union Pacific road. Formorry, the time was dispatched from the headquarters in Omaha. Under the new regulation, which takes effect March 1, the time will be signaled from the observators of the Washington university at St. Louis. The standard for signals of regulation is 10 o'clock a. m., central time. The telegraph wires are connected with an automatic clock in the observatory and the time is announced by vibrations of the pendulum which makes a peculiar sound, which is car-ried over the wires. Repeating instruments are placed at all junction points and the time is announced at all stations on the branch and main line. Superintendent Korty states that under the new regulation, which has been thoroughly tested and found perfect, the service of uniform time will be complete, which will be a vast improvement on the present system. the present system.

A Snow Blockade.

The new rotary snow plow for the Union Pacific was brought in by the Rock Island vesterday and will immediately be forwarded to its field of asefulness on the Gunnison branch of the Union Pacific. The plow is of a narrow gauge design. Traffic on it has been suspended for about two months. As soon as the plow can be put to work and the track cleared up traffic on that line will be resumed. Assistant General Manager Dick-inson states that it will require several days to remove the snow.

Extends the Service.

On Sunday next the Union Pacific will extend the runs of Nos, 42 and 43 passenger trains between Valley and Bentrice on the Lincoln & Manhattan branch so as to run to Blue Springs, a point fifteeen miles beyond are cured by Hood's Sarsaparilla, the | Beatrice. This train leaves Council Bluffs daily at 4:45 a. m.; leaves Omaha at 5:05 a. m. and runs through without change to Manhattan, Kan., making direct connections there with the Kansas division of the Union Pacific railway for all points in Kansas and Colorado westbound, and for Topeka, Lawrence, Kansas City and points east and south via Kansas City. Returning, train leaves Manhattan at 2:25 p. m.; arriving at Beatrice at 6:25 p. m., Lincoln at 7:50 p. m., and Omaha at 11:20 p. m., Coun-eil Bluffs 11:40 p. m., making direct connection with Kansas division trains from Kansas City, Lawrence, Topeka and the east, and from Denver, Salina, Abeline and all points west, enabling passengers to visit the principal points in Kansas and Nebraska in the shortest possible time. These trains have firstclass equipment, consisting of smoking cars and first-class day coaches of the latest pattern. The new train will fill a long felt want, and is bound to be popular.


