FRESH FOMR THE PRESS. Romance of the Last Century. By J. A. Froude. Charles Scribber's Sons, Now York.

Hitherto the literary world has had the opportunity of appreciating Fronds as an historian, essayist and writer of travels, and it has unhesitatingly recognized his exceptional abilities and genius. He has now launched a new craft on the tide of public opinion. This fresh venture is an historical ro-

mance describing Ireland under English rule in the last century.

At that period all honest efforts to establish law and order were paralyzed by the peculiar condition of Irish society, then in a state of moral decomposition. The actions of Irish government officials were contracted, owing to their own personal interest in the conment officials were contracted, owing to their own personal interest in the contrabnd trade with France. This illegal traffic was daily carried on almost under the very eyes of these officials. Their own fortunes were affected by the success of these smuggling operations. This state of affairs was alone sufficient to defeat the execution of English laws and to saturate the whole country with corruntion. country with corruntion. The result could not be otherwise than complete lawlessness. In a great measure this contraband trade arose from the commercial laws framed by England for the purpose of depreciating Irish industries A spirit of rebellion was rife in the land. Agistons were executable in the land. Agitators were everywhere in-citing the poorer classes to insurrection. Arms and ammunition were smuggled over from France, and soldiers were also promised by that country, which had only lately suffered defeat from England and was anxious to strike again. Ire-land, she thought, would prove a vul-

nerable point. Out of such troublous times Froude Cut of such troublous times Froude creates a romance teeming with interest and adventure. Incident succeeds incident with wonderful rapidity. The charm of reading the novel is increased by the nequisition of much historical information. As the author says, that unfortunate island was in no better condition before the Faglish careaust as unfortunate island was in no better condition before the English conquest, as is proved by the annals of the priests, written by themselves before the strangers came among them. These manuscripts tell of rioting, of bloodshedding, as their chief occupation and only glory. The plot of the romance hangs on the actions of the two chiefs of Dunboy, namely: Colonel Goring, of the English army, who has settled in Ireland, on the land previously possessed by Morty Sullivan, the other chief. The latter, at the time of this story, is outlawed, and nourishes an unstory, is outlawed, and nourishes an un-

quenchable hate for his English supplanter.
Colonel Goring's character is magnificently portrayed. His strong religious faith, his cool, undaunted courage, his sense of honor and gentility of disposition, remind one forcibly of General Gordon. Like him, also, he fell, the victim of official incompetence. The scene depicting Goring's death bristles with vivacity and excitement. The galplanter. with vivacity and excitement. The gal-lant officer received a fatal wound while fighting three reckless desperadoes who were fully armed, ne himself having no

weapons whatever.
The outlawed chief, Morty Sullivan, is a very powerful delineation of char-acter. There appears to be a continu-ous war raging in his breast between his better nature and his bitter hate of the English in general, and Goring in particular. The latter feeling finally, in its intensity, stifles the former, and hurls him into an ocean of crime, from which he emerges a pirate and a mur-derer. His tragic end is described with

dramatic force.

The many thrilling episodes are remarkable for a crispness and vim thoroughly fascinating. Fronde's mode of collecting material resembles that of Scott; his agreeable manner of impart-Lord Lytton; the vitality of his dra matis personnae reminds one of Whyte Melville, yet in one respect he falls short of all of them. They all impart a subtle charm of romance to the treatment of their subjects. Fronde rather rejects this brilliant accessory to his novel. But perhaps his crisp, manly treatment leaves this deficiency unlamented.

ARYAS, SEMITES AND JEWS, JEHOVAH AND
THE CREIST, by Lorenzo Burge, Lee &
Shepard, Boston. The first part of this volume is de-voted to a continuation of the history commenced in "Pre-Glacial Man and the Aryan Race," by the same author, with the intention of showing the ac-tions of the Deity in the selection of a people through whom men should be enlightened to receive, and from whom that being should proceed, who should again give to man that revelation previously given to and rejected by the Aryas. It would have been well had the author confined himself to this only, instead of writing the latter portion of the book, in which he promulgates some extraordinary theories of his own manuscript.

extraordinary theories of his own manu-

facture and with these weapons attacks
the established doctrines of the church.
The acceptance of the trinity, he
maintains, almost obliterates the influence of the Father by the greater prominence given to the Son. The barbarinence given to the Son. The burder ism of the middle ages he attributes to the superstitious teachings of the church. The idea of Adam and Eve, in their disobedience to God through being tempted by satan, is denounced as blasphemy. by satan, is denounced as blasphemy. An entirely different meaning is given the episode that occurred in Eden. This is a theory of the author's own invention, and one worth reading as a curiosity. Most people will prefer the spirit of the bible's teachings to the vain imaginings of Mr. Burge.

His intellect is apparently incapable of appreciating the real significance of the sacrifice on the cross. He perceives not that Jesus suffered to give salvation to those who would take up their cross and follow in his footsteps. Mr. Burge opines that all were saved, apparently regardless of any righteous endeavor on their part. Much iamentation is indulged in because of his belief that the church does not comprehend the greaprinciple that "God is love." Yet hit idea of a godly love is a weak, mads lin, and, therefore, dangerous, sentiment, that if accepted, would plunge the world in a vast abyss of misery. Most of his theological conclusions are vapid and feeble. He reminds one of a mariner possessing a beautiful chart, but unable to make his course, owing to a limite I knowledge of seamanship.

The LAST AMERICAS, by J. A. Michell; Frederick A. Stokes & Bro., New York. not that Jesus suffered to give salvation

This describes the visit of some Persian explorers to America in the year sian explorers to America in the year 2951. They find only the ruins of magnificent cities, the ashes of a mighty past—and a young man, his wife and father—the sole representatives of the nation. These three are despatched to join their ancestors, being slain in a bloody skirmish with the Persian visitors. Prosumably the author's object in writing this myth is to warn us of the coming dangers contingent on the pursuance of our present method of wearing out our lives in the hunt for the almighty dollar. The book is very short, provided with excellent illustrations, and is rather amusing.
