Late yesterday afternoon it was rumored in financial circles that the Bank of Omaha was in a shaky condition, and about to suspend.

The announcement created considerable surprise, although the condition of the institution has been generally known in financial circles for some months past; in fact, from the organization of the bank under its present management.

The bank is located at 601 South Thirteenth street. C. P. Needham, ex-county clerk, is president, and Frank Wasserman, late teller of the United States National bank, cashier.

The bank was organized in 1886 by Mr. A. Henry, a present director of the Commercial National bank. Mr. Henry also was engaged in the banking business at Fremont, and was worth about \$1,000,000.

It is reported, however, that Wasserman's lottery ticket only called for \$10,000, and that all of the money was required to square his accounts with the United States National.
