CORN BULLISHLY AFFECTED.

The Provision Pit Shakes Off Its Bearish Feeling -Business in Cattle Slow and Prices Tend Downward-Quotations.

#### CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKETS.

Cricago, June 21 .- [Special Telegram to THE BEE. |- Wheat averaged higher to-day, but the closing range was slightly lower than yesterday, the improvement having all seen lost. Hutchinson figured as a heavy and continuous seller, and as the market was not particularly broad his influence was felt to a considerable extent. In the matter of crop news, the bad reports from the south and southwest were offset by encouraging advices from the northwest. Captain Phillips, who has just returned from a trip through the region around Cairo, in three states, says that the harvest outlook is bad. Heavy rains have left the wheat fields in such shape that the ripe grain can not be harvested, though it has been ready for the reaper for some time. The wheat is of splendid quality, but farmers can not get at it on the bottom lands. He regards the situation in that respect as critical. Generally speaking, the news affoat was merely a threshing over of the straw that has done service for two or three days. Advices from the spring wheat country are of the most flatly contradictory character imaginable. It can not be possible that the views represent a difference in judgment as to the crop merely. Statements of facts from the same localities specifically and directly conflict in letter and spirit. The trade is naturally confused by the contradictory advices, but the tendency is to attach faith to the theory that a serious and perhaps fatal injury to the crop over a large area had resulted before the gains came. Radical views are not generally entertained, however. The delay in harvesting operations along the southern edge of the winter wheat belt is perhaps the most potent cause of the firmness to market. Heavy receipts the wheat market. Heavy receipts in July are hardly expected by the most hopeful bears, and the cash wheat market is plainly showing an increasing spirit of independence on the part of holders. Export clearances, to-day, foot up to nearly 100,000 bushels, and the out movement from all maintending to the control of the c points indicates a very rapid reduction of supplies. Minneapolis stocks thus far this week show a decrease of 300,000 bushels, and it will be no surprise if the total reduction in the visible is not close to 1,000,000 bushels. The opening prices were 80c for June, 78% of for July, 75% c for September and 77% c for December. The low point of the early trad ing was reached soon after the start, June going to 70%c, July to 78%c and December to 77%c. The market advanced to 78%c678%c for July, 76c for September and 77%c for December. On the advance there was an active trade, but at the top and on the subsequent decline Hutchinson sold heavily. The market grad-ually worked back to 77@78c for July, 75%@ The last hour of business was characterized by duliness and languor. The final prices were 80c for June, 75(278) for July, 75%c for September and 77/4c for December. As compared with yesterday's closings these prices record very small changes. Cables were firm and in some cases a shade higher prices were quoted. Private were correspondence indicates some slight uncasiness on account of a probable deliciency in the Russian and Indian crops. New York contributed nothing to the budget of news to-

day.

The wet weather in Illinois and Indiana and small receipts were still builtship affecting corn and again caused a good deal of covering by shorts. There were also a good many scattering orders to buy from various parts of the country where excessive rain has injured the prospects of growing grain. Cables were encouraging to holders and there was a brisk demand reported for ex-port at New York. The decrease in lake freights also favored buyers for shipment from Chicago. After the close of 'change yesterday, the con-cession in freights referred to above induced shippers to charter, and engagements were made to ship out 469,000 bushels, besides what was regularly reported yesterday. There was very little change in the price at the close to-day from that of yesterday, July closing at 344 @34%c, against 34%c.

Oats attracted a fair share of speculative attention, with an early advance in near futures of 36%4c, which was subsequently lost. The shorts were again buying, with the principal business of the day in July, which improved to 234 @234c and back to

which improved to 23½@23½c and back to 22½c, as holders were disposed to sell at the top and buy September. There was some changing at ½c difference in favor month, while deferred deliveries per quiet and easy. Receipts were liberal, while withdrawals from store were increased hile withdrawals from store were increased 225,400 bushels, chiefly No. 3 white. No. provisions shook off their bearish feeling of the past few days. Lighter receipts of

hogs than were anticipated, coupled with another advance in the same, occasioned something of a change in the prevailing sentiment. The disposition recently shown to sell was supplanted by a buying turn. Late bears made free purchases of the product against their outstanding short contracts, and as their anxiety to cover developed a better investment demand, an improvement occurred in values. veloped a better investment demand, an improvement occurred in values. During the last hour of the session the advance movement was particularly strong, and in the different speculative lines the ruing quotations were at the day's highest notch. Based on yesterday's closings, the appreciation actually established amounted to 25@271/c in pork, 5@71/c in lard and 71/c@10c in short ribs.
