The Church Folks Pant at Home or Take to the Woods.

A PASTOR FAINTS IN THE PULPIT.

The Question of Fire Protection-The City Finances-The Day at Manawa-General and Personal.

The Pulpiteers. The attendance at the city churches was light yesterday. Most of the piously inclined were at the Chautauqua grounds or resting at home, The irregularity of services of late, the closing of some of the churches, the heated term and other causes furnished nany an excuse for staying away.

Those who gathered in the Congregational church yesterday morning heard an excelent sermon by the pastor, Rev. Dr. Crofts. His text was "Though He slav me, yet will I trust in Him." The theme of "Trust in God" led the speaker to draw a contrast between Job and some of those who suffered so greatly at Johnstown. It is stated that some of those who lost property and friends by the flood, threw their bible away, declaring they had no further use for it. The speaker did not wonder that such a terrible calamity should cause even reason to totter and cause men to lose faith in God. While not blaming them, one could not but pity them. Faith in God was never taken away by Him. It was of our own losing. It was lamentable to see one throw it away, just when it was most needed. One of the troubles was that our trust in God was often based on material things, instead of upon the invisible. We had trust in God as long as we had prosperity, but when home, when dear ones were taken away, our trust went

too. True faith was the "sub-stance of things hoped for," not the present possession of them. It was the evi-dence of things not seen." If a merchant should tell a customer, "Yes, I will trust you, but not out of my sight. It you pay for these goods right away, before you leave my presence, I will trust you," it would be laughed at as a poor sort of trust. Yet this was the way many trusted God.

And the trouble was that we did not see

the end. God's ways were so mysterious and past finding out that we doubted, be-cause we could not understand all. The ancients did not know so much about the sun as we have learned. They could not ompute its distance, its composition, etc., and yet they made practical use of its light. Thus we ought not to shut our eyes to the ight of God's truth, simply because we do

not comprehend it.

Last evening Colonel Hoagiand, "the newsboy's friend," gave an interesting address on "Ten Years Among the Boys," He has been very active in the work of reform-ing the street waifs, and securing homes for boys and girls. Some of his experiences are thrilling. He will remain here a few days org anizing a local committee to carry on the

work here. Yesterday morning Rev. Mr. Harris, of the Bethany Baptist church, was so overcome by the heat while preaching that he fell in a faint.

Very interesting services were held yester-day at the Second Presbyterian church on Harmony street. This was formerly the Harmony mission, and since it has gone under the control of the Presbyterian church has become a strong society. The building itself has been enlarged to double its former size, and will be dedicated next Sunday. The Trinity Methodist Episcopal society has purchased a lot at the corner of Ninth avenue and Fourth street, and will soon proceed to erect a church building.

Better Fire Protection. At a meeting held Friday morning the

chairman of the fire committee, the chief of the fire department and the chief engineer of the waterworks company decided that hereafter full fire pressure should be turned on at once whenever an alarm of fire was received. Notwithstanding this fact, no official notice of the fact has yet been given the parties at the rolice station, whose duty it would be to make the change in case an alarm should be received. The mere fact that these gentlemen passed a certain resolution will be productive of little good unless

they look to its enforcement.

Another matter which was brought to public notice at the recent fire on Upper Broadway, demands immediate attention. When the water was turned on, the stream that issued from the nozzle was little else than thin mnd, and so centinued for several minutes, gradually growing less muddy, at though at the end of fifteen minutes the stream was very dark and opaque, showing the presence of a great deal of sediment in the pipe. There is hardly any room for doubt but that the main was partially clog-ged with mud, and it is equally certain that such is the case in other parts of the city. In the suburbs, a four-inch main is used to supply the hydrants and all consumers. In a number of the outlying portions of the city, the water consumption is very light, and there is nothing to prevent the deposit of

considerable seliment. This may result in very materially clogging these mains at a time when such an obstruction would be attended with serious results. This matter was attended to for a while, but for some time past no attention whatever has been The hydrants were opened periodically,

and the water turned on, thus allowing the full force of the water to flush the mains, washing out all of the sediment and leaving the mains clean and unobstructed. It is sug-gested that it would be wise to resume this practice, repeating it at least once a month.

There is no doubt but that the size of the mains in the suburbs is much smaller than it should be at present, but they were laid in many instances before any of the factories were built that now rely upon them for pro-tetion. These mains are of sufficient size to supply a single line of hose, but many buildings have gone up in these localities which, should they get afire, would require more than a single stream to insure their protection. This being the case additional mains on parallel streets seems to be the only solu-

tion of the difficulty unless the present mains are replaced with larger pape.

The several disastrous fires that have occurred recently clearly prove that there is a difficulty somewhere and a remedy is demanded. The city has a couple of steamers standing idle, and a large number of citizens are urging their return to active service. With the mains as they are, there is plenty of water to be had even if there is not pressure, and with a steamer in service and suitable connections for the suction, a failure in pressure could not leave property unprotected. At these last few fires all the firemen could do was to stand around and swear, but unless these charges are made, the privilege of swearing will rightfully belong to the burned-out property owner.

Chautauqua Lots. One feature connected with the Chautauqua that augurs well for the future of this grand enterprise, is the desire of so many parties to effect leases of lots for a term of years that they may erect cottages before another season opens. The demand for such leases has been very active ever since the opening of the present session, but owing to the great amount of other business, the trus-tees were unable to give the matter proper attention. This has at last been decided and the terms for leases finally determined. each, and the lessee is required to pay 10 per cent per annum of this assessed valuation. The leases run from one to ten years, but at the ead of the ten years another appraise-ment of the lots will be made, and the same

ment of the lots will be made, and the same rate of interest must be paid as before. A number of lots have already been leased, many of them by outsiders, and it is expected that many more will be leased before the close of the present assembly.

It is encouraging to know that several parties have announced their intention of erecting cottages another year, while there are scores of families in the city which have made arrangements to secure tents and remain upon the grounds during the entire session next season.

sion next season The majority of the people seem to be but just waking up to the full meaning of the enterprise, and now that they fully understand it, express their appreciation in the most extravagant terms. It is hoped that the difficulty experienced

this year in securing money to push the improvements at the grounds and arrange for the excellent programme will not be met with hereafter, as the people have been able to see what the result is to be and can not fail to appreciate it. It will soon be time to begin to arrange for next year, and another call for money will be made to secure a programme that will be even better than that of this season. All should be sufficiently interested to see that the response is prompt and liberal.




