DIED IN THE TOWER, The Unaccountable Suicide of an Ex-

emplary Laborer. Yesterday afternoon, shortly after 3 o'clock, the lifeless body of James Gallagher, was found hanging in the tower of the American Water Works company's building at Florence. The discovery was made by a couple of men who had been engaged in putting in the system of electric light which is to illuminate the building. In the absence of Coroner Drexel, Deputy Sheriff Houck held the inquest, the jury, consisting of Messrs. Cowin, Wilkie, King, Walker, Baker and Grebe, returning a verdict that Gallagher had come to his death by hanging. There was little doubt of this fact because the rope which is used to "steady" workmen in ascending the steep ladder

to the tower was found with two coils around the unfortunate's neck and several coils of it around his arms. The body hung through a small aperture through which access was obtained to the interior of the highest compartment of the tower. The head was above the opening, and in endeavoring to ascend into the attic to cut down the remains, Mr. Baker, the coro-ner's representative, with difficulty forced his way beside the suicide's body. The neck was not broken; the victim had strangled, and the face, which was handsome

and intelligent, was discolored.

The deceased was thirty-seven years of age and had worked as a laborer at the age and had worked as a laborer at the waterworks since last April, going there from South Omaha. He boarded at the house of J. F. Swasy, near the works. He was quiet and retiring in disposition and favorably impressed all who knew him. As usual, he did his own washing in the morning. He allowed himself to be shaved by a barber, later, and remarked to Mr. Swasey that the wast to first time he had allowed another's ber, later, and remarked to Mr. Swasey that it was the first time he had allowed another's razor to pass over his face. He ate dinner, blacked his boots and disappeared. No one suspected the man's dreadful intent, although it was later recalled that he had said he was prepared to die. On his person were found \$40 in gold and a silver watch. There are \$20 due from the company. His There are \$20 due from the company. His pantaloons were dusty at the knees, showing that he had prayed before he leaped.

In the unfortunate's trunk was found a number of letters, one from Hannah Gallagber, of Highland, Kan., which was dated in 1884. Another was signed by Susie Gallagher, whose address was 3830 Lake avenue. A third, probably from a sister, tells him to address 4234 Chappel Place. Chicago. A fourth is a sorrowful recital of the poverty and affliction of his parents in Ireland, who were entirely dependent upon what they could receive from their children in this

country.
