persons, having a practical know edge of banking, to make an examination of the affairs of every bank as often as shall be deemed necessary and proper and at least once in every year, but no person shall be appointed who is an officer, stockholder, member, partner or clerk in any banking institution of this state. Section 7 provides that these examiners

may require.

shall have power to make a thorough exam ination into all books, papers and affairs of the bank, to administer oaths and affirmations and to examine on oath or affirmation any individual banker and officers, agents partners and clerks of such bank, and to summon, and by attachment compel the at-tendance of any inhabitant of the state, to testify under oath before him or them in re-lation to the affairs of such corporation, firm or individual or individual.

Section S provides that the bank examiners shall be paid \$10 a day, which shall be paid to him by the bank whose affairs are examined, provided that the fees paid for any single examination shall not be less than \$10 nor more than \$20.

Section 9 provides that every bank which shall fail to make any report required by the provisions of this act shall be subject to a enalty of \$50 for each day that it delays to make such report; and every person who shall willfully and knowingly make, or cause to be made, any faise statement or faise entries in the books of any bank, or shall knowingly subscribe or exhibit false papers, with the intent to deceive the ex-aminer, or shall make, state or publish any faise statement of the amount of the capital because any faise statement of the same and the same and the statement of the same and the same a assests, surplus or undivided profits, shall be guilty of felony, and upon conviction shall be fined not e xceeding \$10,000, and be imprisoned in the state penitentiary not less than one nor more than five years.

Section 10 provides that every bank shall, at all times, have on hand, as a reserve, an amount equal to at least 15 per cent of the amount equal to at least 15 per cent of the aggregate amount of its deposits and im-mediate liabilities. That savings banks, do-ing an exclusively savings bank business, shall have on hand, at all times, as a reserve, in available funds, an amount equal to at least 5 per cent of its deposits and immedi-ate liabilities. The available funds shall con-sist of cash on hand and balances due the corporation, firm or individual, from good, solvent banks. Immediate liabilities shall solvent banks. Immediate liabilities shall include all claims against the corporation, payable on demand. Cash shall include specie, legal tender notes, bills of solvent banks, and exchange for any clearing house banks, and exchange for any clearing house association. Whenever the available funds of any bank shall fall below the reserve re-quired, such bank shall not increase its lid-bilities by making any new loans or dis-counts, otherwise than by discounting or purchasing bills of exchange payable at sight; nor shall such bank make any divi-dend of its profits until it has on hand the available funds required by this act. The auditor of public accounts may notify any such bank, in case its reserve shall fall below the amount required, to make good such reserve without delay, and any failure for the period of thirty days to make good any deficiency in the amount of deposits re-quired to be kept on hand shall be cause for the appointment of a receiver. Section 11 provides that the total liabilities of any corporation, firm or individual to any

up capital Section f2 provides that no bank, corpora-tion, firm or individual engaged in the bank-ing, broker, exchange or deposit business, ing, broker, exchange or denosit business, shall accept or receive on deposit, with or without interest, any money, bank bills or notes, or United States treasury notes, or currency or other notes, bills or drafts, cir-culating as money or currency, when such bank or corporation, firm or individual, is in-solvent.

Section 13 provides that if any such bank Section 13 provides that if any such bank shall receive deposits when insolvent, any officer of such bank who shall knowingly re-ceive, be accessory, or permit or connive at the receiving or accepting such deposits, shall be guilty of a folony, and upon convic-tion thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$10,000, or by imprisonment in the penitentiary not exceeding five years, or by both five and imprisonment.
