THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

General Features of Wheat Trading Unchanged From Tuesday.

CORN QUIET AS TO SPECULATION

Oats Experience Periods of Positive Duliness-The Tendency of Provisions in Favor of Holders -Cattle Business Active.

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKETS.

CHICAGO, August 7 .- [Special Telegram to THE BEE. |-The general features of the wheat market were unchanged from the prominent characteristics of the previous day. Duliness, inactivity and narrow fluc tuations again prevailed, with a downward tendency to prices. Apart from the news of the day there is an underlying feeling dominating the minds of speculators that we have an abundant erop of excellent wheat more than sufficient for our own wants, and with enough surplus to satisfy all possible demands upon us from abroad. Fluctuations in the active month-December-were from 781/c at the opening to 781/c within an hour thereafter, and the ups and downs from that time to the close were within a 1/4c range. The closing price was 781/@78%c, which is from %c to %c lower than the resting figure. The news afforded by early bulletins was in favor of the bears. The principal factor was the collapse of the wet weather boom in England, the weather being reported improving to-day, and the Liverpool market in consequence was quoted %@1d lower. Late private cables yesterday shadowed bear dispatches to the board this morning, but a confirmation of the fact was the cause of the weak opening. Beerbohm supplied additional comfort to the bears by reporting an increase of 1,392,000 bushels in the quantity on ocean passage, which, however, exceeded by 512,000 the computation of the board of trade correspondent, who figured the increase at 880,000, but even a smaller quantity was a fair bear argument. Everything was lovely around the harvest fields of the spring wheat region, and the weather in the southwest was likewise favorable to the threshing of winter wheat. Items from which the bulls drew comfort were not wanting in force when sup-ported by the abiding faith which is found in hopeful breasts. There wero dispatches shown on the floor, said to be from reliable parties, which reported damage of a serious nature from frost early in the week extending fifty miles south of the Canadian line. Exporters were buying moderate quantities in New York to-day, fifteen boat loads being reported taken, and there was good inquiry for cash wheat here and for vessel room, although the actual charters reported were only 96,000 bushels. The foregoing appears to furnish a fair amount of encouragement to the bulls, but, as indicated the weather of the bear accurate. above, the bears secured the substantial advantage of a decline of %c in the active futures, which is the view of the surroundings

most acceptable to the majority to-day.

The corn market was again quiet in the way of speculation, and in the shipping demand early there was much heaviness, and the market sold off some, but part of this was subsequently recovered. At the close seller September was about 1/2 lower than it closed yesterday. The market was narrow, however, and the range covered by the fluctuations was only about 1/4c. At the close the feeling was barely steady.

Oats lapsed into quietude, with the regular market at times positively dull. Trading or-ders were not pressing and the feeling was a shade easier, partly in sympathy with corn. The possible exception was the relative the possible exception was the relative strength in December, owing to some orders to sell September and buy the month named, with few sellers appearing. No. 2 whiteoats for September sold at 24½c. They were subsequently offered at 24½ce. No. 2 regular sold fairly well at 20½c.

In provisions the tendency is still some-what favorable for holders. Trading opened this morning with a feeling quite bullish and the market promptly showed an advancing inclination under the lead of lard. In the last named article there was considerable stir and also a rather sharp advance. Pork and short ribs were also in comparatively good demand for a while after the opening. Subsequently operations all around became conservative, yet there was no marked change in the prevailing tone and the best prices of the day were obtained at or just before the adjournment of Johange. Based on fore the adjournment of 'change. Based on yesterday's last quotations the day's actual advance in pork was 5@75/c, in lard 10@125/c and in short ribs 21/07%c.

NEW YORK, August 7 .- | Special Telegram to THE BRE. |- STOCKS-There was a less bullish feeling in stocks at the uptown re sorts last night and less decisive action in the general list early to-day. It was conceded that much of the short interest has been eliminated and its force lost on the bull side. It was apparent that the leading bulls sold on the closing decline yesterday; it was thought both to take out profits and shake out a too numerous following. The Chicago interest is bullish for a long run, and dispatches indicate that the public may become buyers to the extent of preventing any more than a healthful recreation. The taking of Burlington by inside parties attracts attention. First prices were generally slight fractions higher than last evening's figure, but Delaware & Hudson was exceptional with a rise of % per cent at 14614. There were further advances in early dealings of small fractions, though in a few cases marked strength was shown, and Lake Erie & Western preferred, after opening up 1/4 per cent at 62, rose 134 per cent to 6 34, but afterward lost a portion of the improvement. Chesapeake & Ohio stocks were strong and first preferred rose 1/2 per cent to 681/4, and Rock Island rose % per cent. Burlington moved up 1/2 to 1081/4, St. Paul 1/4 to 721/4, Missouri Pacific 1/4 to 71 and Union Pacific 3/4 per cent to 61. The entire market then reted and most stocks returned to small fractions below the opening figures. After the first hour there was a drooping tendency in stocks, with slight changes until noon During the closing hours there was more depided weakness because of the prospect of further disturbances among southwestern roads. Changes from last night were not significant except in Chesapeake & Ohio comn, which was 1/4 per cent higher at 251/4 for first preferred and % per cent over the

The Situation in Northeastern Nebraska Very Flattering. SIOUX CITY, In., August 7 .- [Special to The Bee. |-There was a very heavy rain between Norfolk and this city, Cedar and Wayne counties being in the center of the storm. The upper branches of the Logan are bank full and a washout is reported on the Hartington branch. So far as appears on the Norfolk branch little damage was done, while a heavy rain will be of great advantage to grass, corn and other late crops. The general outlook for crops has been unusually fine. Some threshing of wheat in

Wayne county gave from twenty to twenty seven bushels per acre.

The grading is completed and bridging well under way on the Sioux City & Ogden rail-road, or Pacific Short Line, to Plainview, in Pierce county. A large portion of the grad-ers on this line have gone to work on the Sioux City & Northwestern railroad between Merritt station and Palisades, where this railroad is to intersect the Manitoba rail-road, thus making a second direct line to Duluth, and with the Union Pacific a continuous line to the Pacific coast from Sioux

The corn palace festival in Sloux City will in many respects excel either of its prede cessors. The palace will be higher and more ample. The harvest excursions will enable many to see Nebraska's mammoth crops and take in this festival.
