OUTLOOK STILL ENCOURAGING.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—(Special Telegram) The Review, R. G. Dun & Company's weekly review of trade says: "Two heavy frosts, with aggregate losses estimated at \$15,000,000 or more may have an influence upon several branches of trade which cannot yet be estimated."

Wertz Looking After.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The annual report of General Habrun, solicitor of the treasury, shows that the sum of \$30,000,000 principal and interest, is due the government, as evidenced by the judgments of the circuit and district courts, but that no reliable estimate can be given of the actual amount of the debt.
