

### DUN'S REVIEW OF THE WEEK.

**A Coolest Feeling Prevailing All Over the Country.**  
The money markets are strained at the east, close in Chicago, Cleveland and Detroit, and closer than before at Kansas City and Omaha, but other western points are fairly supplied. But the advance in the Bank of England rate, and the signs of possible disturbance resulting from excessive speculation abroad, render the monetary outlook here less clear. The heavy disbursements for interest and dividends, estimated at \$60,224,710 in New York alone, nearly 60 per cent more than last year, will tend to precipitate a crisis. Reports from other centers of trade will show that the unseasonably warm weather is having a depressing influence, but in other respects the markets are better. Farmers and other mills are temporarily closed for repairs.

His method of procedure, as described in the Brooklyn Medical Journal, was as follows: On December 21, 1889, a man died in the hospital of pyemia following a compound fracture of the arm, and about twenty minutes after his death two large, well-defined flaps were removed from the legs of the corpse. The flaps were laid in water for a few minutes and then laid on to the body of the living patient and sutured in place.
