THEY OPPOSE PROHIBITION. Nebraska Turners Urged to Defeat the Amendment. The following resolutions were adopted by the Turn back at its recent convention in this city: Whereas, There are proposed several measures in the congress of the United States for the regulation of immigration and for the regulation of naturalization; and Whereas, The turners, mostly emigrants and naturalized citizens of this country, are affected directly and indirectly by the operation of such laws, whose working and form show a certain spirit of hatred; therefore Resolved, That the turners of the Nebraska turner district, held at Omaha, January 28, 1890, that the committee of the North American turner body be requested, for the purpose of discussing the above bills and all questions appertaining thereto and for the purpose of taking some measures in regard thereto, to call a conference as soon as possible at St. Louis, Mo., or some other large city of the United States. Resolved, That a call for such a conference should be issued by means of the press to all turners in the United States, and to all countries whose members are aliens or naturalized citizens. Resolved, That a central committee of the North American turner body be organized with full authority in regard to these questions to appear before all the committees of congress of the United States, as far as the interests of Nebraska are concerned. Resolved, That all other conventions of districts or the separate turner societies be suspended and the turners be urged to take appropriate measures for the judicious and honorable solution of these questions. Resolved, That the president of the Nebraska turner district be authorized to act as the delegate to such a conference or to name a substitute. The following resolution in regard to the impending vote on prohibition in the state of Nebraska was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That the Nebraska turner district declares that it is the duty of every turner not only to vote against the amendment in regard to prohibition to be submitted to the people of Nebraska at the next fall election, but also to induce all citizens in the sphere of its acquaintance to do so, and that nobody neglects his duty in regard to voting. Resolved, That this resolution be published in all the papers of liberal policy. THE ROBERTSON ASSAULT. All the Arrested Parties to be Given a Hearing on Thursday. The gang of fellows arrested for being concerned in the assault upon the Robinson woman and her little daughter Saturday morning were brought before Judge Holsley yesterday afternoon. The names of White C. Gillen, the eye painter, were called first. Both had given bonds of \$750 a piece, and when White stepped forward he was informed that his bond would then and there be increased to \$1,500. He was accompanied by a lawyer, and gave the new bond without making any questions. Gillen, however, was represented by a lawyer, who made the point on the court that the bond of his client having been once fixed could not be increased until after the examination, which the court then set for Thursday. Pat Lynch, Charles White and Sidney Hewitt were then held temporarily to answer to the charge of assault and battery, until the officers can do further work in the way of collecting evidence, etc., in the case. Tom Carroll and Stem Daley were held under the same charge, though later in the day the county attorney filed information charging them with assault with a deadly weapon on the little girl, Flora Robinson. E. & M. V. Has Its Eye, Etc. As soon as President Harrison signs the Ponca Indian reservation in South Dakota, the Fremont, Elkhorn and Missouri Valley road company will be ready to commence active operations towards extending the Verdieris branch of its system and occupying the best portion of that territory. General Passenger agent Buchanan said he spread a map on the desk in front of him: "I can probably show you something very few people know anything about, which is worth mentioning." He indicated a long, narrow strip in Holt county, Nebraska, lying between the Nebraska river and Dakota line, and continued: "In there, are 400,000 acres subject to this act, which comes under the control of and will be entered through the United States land office at O'Neill. It belongs to Nebraska by reason of the fact that, some years ago, the division between this state and Dakota, which then bordered the Nebraska river to its mouth, was changed so as to run straight across from a bend in Holt county to the Missouri river. "It might also state, without contradiction, that there is not a finer or richer body of land in America." "That is a fact," exclaimed A. B. Chard, receiver of the O'Neill land office, who sat on the opposite side of Mr. Buchanan's desk vigorously writing, describing the soil, location and surrounding advantages, to be printed and distributed broadcast. "There are hundreds of settlers waiting to rush in just as soon as the title comes and take up their claims. The entire reservation and almost every foot of it is adapted to agriculture and will be occupied quickly and a splendid country tributary to Omaha developed within the next few years." Mr. Buchanan would not acknowledge what his company proposes to do; neither did he deny when questioned that it is preparing to build from Verdieris to the north, which the turners have under consideration, whether it would not be better to start a new branch at O'Neill, twenty-eight miles south of the reservation, to be extended from Verdieris. O'Neill being the county seat and only town of any importance in that section, it is thought the people up there will want rail communication with it and the east of building from there will be no greater. Henry C. Jarrett's presence in Omaha at this particular time as manager of the Saltville company has received much comment in railroad circles, on the subject of fast rail-roading. It was stated by Mr. Jarrett, acting on exhibition with Ticket Agent Valli, at the Burlington office, a souvenir ticket, secured in solid silver, now a valued memento of the famous Jarrett-Palmer theatrical train, that went across the continent from New York to San Francisco in 1876. The trip, which at that time created an immense sensation and has not been equaled since, was made in three days, six hours and thirty minutes. Jarrett & Palmer was the name of a dramatic firm, and they longed to do something that would give them a reputation. When it became necessary to transport some company under their management to the Pacific coast they conceived the idea of doing it by rail. Arrangements were accordingly made and at 1 o'clock on Thursday the 1st day of June, 1876, the train left New York and reached the Golden Gate Sunday evening, consuming just 81 hours, 33 minutes and 7 seconds on the road. The fast mail now comes nearer covering the run in that time than any train ever put on yet; its schedule is twenty-four hours longer. Mr. Jarrett still points to that wonderful feat with pride and delight to talk about it. Freight representatives of all the Nebraska roads have gone to a meeting in Chicago of the trans-Missouri association, at which it is expected the question of lower rates on live stock from Omaha will be settled.
