Wheat Bulges Slightly at Opening, but Soon Recovers.

NO IMPORTANT CORN TRADING.

Trading in Oats Mostly of a Local Character-An Unusually Light Day in Provisions-Cattle and Hogs.

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKETS.

CHICAGO, March 6 .- | Special Telegram to THE BEE.]-At 1 o'clock today May wheat was at the best price of the Jay, 79%c. The range for the session was but 1/c, but the pit was active most of the time and there was a good business, including not a little from New York and the northwest. In a general way the local trade antagonized Pardridge and Hutchinson and played for a break all day long. It did not come. The bottom figure for May, 78%c, was but %c under the opening and 3gc under the closing price of last night. Just at the opening there was a little bulge from 78%c to 79%c followed by a fight for the control at 7836@79c. After a drop to 78% the rally was quick to 79c, and after selling back under that figure good buying about midday put the price to 79Mc. Phillipps was back from the southern wheat fields and not only said there was no serious damage but was a seller in the pit. The general fall of snow over the most of the wheat belt was of course a bearish influence. There was nothing very decisive in outside news. Liverpool quoted spot wheat 14d up early, but Paris reported wheat and flour easy. The northwest bought wheat and New York sold here. There was considerable playing for advantage in the pit by heavy local operators. Pardridge was a persistent buyer through many brokers. Hutchinson bought heavily and acted as if he thought he had the crowd short. Poole's buying was credited to Kent and his followers. Warren and Geddes bought around 79c. Liverpool buying orders were executed in futures. The leading seiling early was by W. F. Cobb & Co. and Schwartz & Dupee, the latter said to be unloading by Bloom. There was a lit-tle tussic in wheat just at the close to decide whether May should close over or under 78%c. The close was at 78%c, exactly the same as yesterday. Other closing prices were: March 78c, June 7814c, July 7614c. These were the bottom prices of the day for These were the bottom prices of the day for June and July. It was claimed at the close that the New York selling in this market was in anticipation of the government statement due here next Monday, but which is suspected of leaking out in New York.

The corn market was not disturbed by any

important trading nor by any news from the outside. -In this market Aldrich and Secke were fair buyers early, but offerings were more free later and any slight gain was lost. The range was narrow. March 281/sc. May sold at 29% e and 29% @29%, closing at 29% c. Other closing prices were: April 30c, June 30c, July 30% c, August 31% c. September 32c. Oats were quiet and steady, with trading mainly of a local character. The demand was not urgent and offerings were moderate This does not affect trading here and the price changes were small. There was business in the way selling March and buying May at a le difference. Futures beyond May were neglected. Cariots of No. 2 in store were dull at 2014@2014c. No. 2 white in store was slow at 221/4c bid.

The market for hog products attracted very little attention today and tracing was unusually light in all departments. Local operators were not inclined to do much business and orders from outside parties were smaller than for several days past. The re-ceipts of hogs were moderately free at all principal western packing points, with pri-ces rather favoring buyers. The report of the packing of the westfor the week snowed a decrease of 25,000 hogs, but this appeared to have little effect on the market. Eastern reports indicated a quiet feeling in that quarter and the advices from Liverpool quoted a 3d decline in lard. Arrivals of products were only fair, while shipments of all kinds were liberal, mainly by eastern lines. Speculative trading was confined within narrow limits and fluctuations in prices were slight Trading was chiefly in small lots and for May and July deliveries. Transfers between these months were made at the current difference of 10c on mess pork, 10@12% on lard and 10@12% on shortrib sides. The changes in prices were meagre and the market closed tame at about yesterday's figures. The ship ping demand was light and offerings were somewhat limited. Inquiry was chiefly for small lots and buyers were rather slow to

The bulls have ceased to even talk of an upturn in values until conditions change. The bears, led by Cammack and Jones, also express mild opin ions, but claim that a further drop in prices might bring in the public and create quite a change in the market. S. V. White declares that if Gould would take hold, even of his own stocks, in earnest upon his return that it would turn the tide for a general advance, The market started with Chicago parties pretty free sellers of the active list, and London selling St. Paul, Union Pacific and Northern Pacific. Altogether there was early a firm undertone to dealings and slight appreciations in values. The entire interest in the market was absorbed by four active stocks, two of which showed considerable strength in early trading, but yielded partially later in the hour. While there are some bunches of good cattle on the market, the receipts are of a commonish order. The market on steers opened lower and very slow, dragging along through the forenoon and even till after dinner with no life buyers being indifferent and seller no life, buyers being indifferent and seller anxious. While there were a few sales re anxious. ported steady at yesterday's prices the mar-ket ruled 5c to 10c lower, some sales being reported even lower than 10c under yesterday's quotations, closing weak with considerable unsold. There were fewer cows among the receipts in proportion than yes-terday and as a consequence cows fared better than steers. The market opened slow with sales made readily on any-

what they wanted that ruled yesterday. Sales were reported as much as 10c lower than yesterday, but they were exceptional ones. Buyers think they paid as much for the same quality as they paid yesterday. On account of buyers selecting the pest cows sellers were made to feel that the market was being shaded. The sales indi-cate no change except on the least desirable. Nearly all of the latter sold before the close of the market shaded off in some cases 5@ 10c. Feeders and stockers continue insufficient to meet the domains and prices rule firm and high. Bulls, particularly large, fine export buils, have been active and strong selling as high as \$3.50.
