There is little real enthusiasm in force anywhere. Events of importance do not catch the attention of the trade and unimportant rumors are chased in hope of important news. Another fortnight and the money question will cease to be an important factor. In that time also the rate troubles will be cleared up. Already points given out on Atchison last week are coming true.
