# POPE LEO'S PLAN.

He Would Serve as Mediator to Dis-

arm all European Nations. [Copuright 1890 by James Gordan Bennett,] ROME, March 10.- | New York Herald Cable-Special to THE BEE. |- I have the authority of the vatican to announce through the Herald that the pope would consent to act as a mediator through which the simultancous disarmament of the European nations | might be brought about. Leo XIII. has taken a bold stand. He holds that the existence of the immense armies which are draming the wealth of Europe and inflicting great suffering on the tolling masses is entirely unchristian.

The German emperor wrote an autograph letter inviting the pope to send an ambas-sador to the Berlin labor conference. In reply the pope sent an autograph letter say-ing he could not take part unless his representative was given the precedent over all other delegates. Then the emperor wrote another letter urging the pope, in the interest of mankind, to take part in the conference so far as he could, and at least give it his moral support. To this the remits has warmly acquired. could, and at least give it his moral support. To this the pentiff has warmly acquiesced. I am authorized to announce that the pope has written a document dealing with the entire problem raised at Berlin. This has been diplomatically communicated to the papal nuncio in Germany and will be laid before the international conference. There is no doubt that a great movement is on foot to give the pape the leading part in the effort to deal with universal labor troubles. His holiness recognized this as a great opportunity for the church to out itself at the nead holiness recognized this as a great opportunity for the church to put itself at the head of a world-wide reform demanded by organized labor. He holds that the nations must adopt the principles of Christianity, and that the church is the only power competent to deal with the tremendous issues in the social and industrial movement.

The pope has spoken in no uncertain voice, as will be seen when his address is made public. He admitted that if the millions of armed men who trample upon the

lions of armed men who trample upon the bread trays of the poor were stripped of their uniforms and set to work creating wealth, a great deal of the present distress in the world would disappear. One nation dare not begin to disarm before another, and the pope is now in position to negotiate be-tween the nations for a general disarmament.

### BISMARCR'S RESIGNATION. Prominent German-Americans Give

Their Views on the Result. NEW YORK, March 19 .- [Special Telegram to THE BEE. ]-No occurrence of recent years in German history or politics has created so much excitement or general interest among Germans as the severance of the official relations between the emperor and the iron chancellor. "I was startled by the news," said William Steinway, "although I have feared such an outcome for some time. There are evidently grave differences of opinion between the young emperor and the greatest statesman which Germany ever had. The Germans here are filled with the gravest apprehensions, although nobody questions the good intentions of the emperor. The immediate results of his homolobing with the socialists have not been of the most with the socialists have not been of the most encouraging nature. We all fear that it will eventually create considerable evil and be followed by a period of reactionary measures. It is certain that the young German empiro is not only surrounded by but filled with relentless enemies. It is also certain that Bismarck, who spent a lifetime in cementing the unity of Germany undoubtedly held

# GIGANTIC FRAUDS.

Attempt to Swindle an Express Company Out of a Million. FREDERICKSBURG, Va., March 19 .- | Special Telegram to THE BEE. |-One of the most gigantic schemes of fraud and forgery that has probably ever been known in this country, has been made public here. Suit was brought by Dr. Harrison Wagner against the Adams express company for \$1,564,875. The signatures to the documents were forged, and when Lawyer White was asked to represent the plaintiff in the suit, he at once denounced the whole scheme as a fraud pany of what he had done. Mr. Herring, one of the managers of the Adams' express company, accompanied by John L. Thomas of Baltimore, counsel for the company, came to Fredericksburg. On examination of the alleged signature of William B. Dinsmore as president of the company on some of the documents, Mr. Herring, who was fa-miliar with it at once pronounced it a forgery and stated he was satisfied other signatures were forgeries. Wagner is in Washington and will be arrested. The express company will take steps to have him indicted. Seme ten or twelve years since one Harrison Wagner had brought a number of suits against the Adams express company in Maryland near Fredericksburg, and was given one year in jall on account of his performances.

# THAT ENGLISH FLAG EPISODE. Misleading Dispatch.

LISBON, March 19 .- | Special Cablegram to THE BEE. ]-A dispatch from Mezambique says that the British flag was hoisted at Chiloma. The Journal Corrieo Tamanha, referring to this dispatch, says it does not know where Chiloma is, but if it is south of the confluence of the Shire and Ruo the British occupation is inexplicable, and if it is north of the confluence the British act is not in good faith in view of the pending ne-gotiations. The paper adds that the cabi-net at yesterday's meetings reached important decisions, regarding which absolute se-crecy is maintained. The opposition jour-nals deciare that if the action of the British at Chiloma is the result of the Portugese government's policy, the government might baye spared itself the trouble of stifling the

The evening papers print London telegrams stating that the hoisting of the British flag on the British steamer Shire gave rise to the report of the hoisting of the flag in the Shire district. They also state that Chiloma is north of the confluence of the Shire and Ruo.
