THE SOUND OF LIGHT.

Wonderful Discovery which May Have Many Interesting Results.

One of the most wonderful discoveries in science that have been made within the last year or two is the fact that a beam of light produces sound, says the American Art Journal. A beam of sun-light is thrown through a lens on a glass vessel that contains lampblack, colored silk or worsted, or other substances. disk having slits or openings cut in it is made to revolve swiftly in this beam of light, so as to cut it up, thus making alternate flashes of light and shadow. On putting the car to the glass vessel strange sounds are heard so long as the flashing beam is falling on the vessel.

Recently a more wonderful discovery has been made. A beam of sunlight is made to pass through a prism, so us to produce what is called the solar spec-trum or rainbow. The disk is turned, and the colored light of the rainbow is made to break through it. Now, place the ear to the vessel containing the silk. wool, or other material. As the colored lights of the spectrum fall upon it sounds will be given by different parts of the spectrum, and there will be silence in

For instance' if the vessel contains red worsted and the green light flashes upon it loud sounds will be given. Only feebl sounds will be heard when the red and blue parts of the rainbow fall upon the vessel, and other colors make no sound nt all. Green silk gives sound best in red light. Every kind of material gives more or less sound in different colors. and utters no sound in others. The discovery is a strange one, and it is thought that more wonderful things will come

A Spot Where Rain Falls Perpetually. D. R. Parkham tells of a curious phe

place where rain falls perpetually, says the Atlanta Constitution. The spot is located on a little knoll in a thin wood on the Shipp place, two miles from Thad Mr. Parkham says the discovery was first made last Thursday, and that rain has been failing stendily on the knoll since that time. The downfall covers a space of fifty square feet. This space is perfectly wet, and the leaves on the ground are full of water. Mr. Parkham says he visited the place with G. A. McBride at noon Tuesday. There was not a cloud to be seen in the sky and the leaves everywhere except on the square were as dry as tin-"I stood with the space between me and the sun," said Mr. Parkham, "and saw the raindrops coming down from the sky. I held out my handker-chief and it was soon saturated with water." Mr. Parkham says that everybody who hears about the phenome is skeptical, but that the many who have visited the pince in the last few days have gone away convinced. No one has yet offered an explanation of the mysterious rainfall. Mr. Parkham suggests that some powerful unknown substance attracts the moisture from the atmosphere.

TRAVEL FOR CONSUMPTION.

An Instance of the Beneficial Effects of Open-Air Lafe.

Dr. Henry L. Bowditch has given the Climatological association an account of treatment which seems to have counteracted a strong tendency to con-sumption in his own family, says the Popular Science Monthly. In 1808 his father, then thirty-live years old was un-doubtedly threatened with consumption. On August 29 of that year, when thus ill, he started from Salem. Mass. with a friend as his companion and driver, in an open one-horse chase for a tour through New England. lasted thirty days and covered 748 miles. During that time he passed from the deepest mental discouragement and hysical wakness through all stages of eling up to a real enjoyment of life. His journey, though benefitting him immensely, probably did not wholly cure him, but it proved to him the absolute need he had of regular, dally, physical, open air exercise. Afterward, under ward of one and a half to two miles, taken three appeared. He died, thirty years after the rney, from carcinoma of the stomach, his lungs being normal except that one presented evidences of an ancient cicatrix at its apex. He prescribed for his children the

same regular out-of-door exercise which serious companint against Paddy Murray and * had been so beneficial to him. As soon as they were old enough they were required to take daily morning walks of about a mile and a half. If at any time they were observed to be drooping, they were taken from school and sent into the country to have farm-life and out-ofdoor play to their hearts' content. In consequence of this early in-struction, all his descendants have become thoroughly impressed with the advantages of padally walking, of summer vacations in the country, and of camping out, etc., among the mountains. Dr. Bowditch's father had married his cousin, who, after long

invalidism, died of chronic phthisis in 1834. Certainly a consanguineous union of two consumptives foreboded nothing but evil. Yet, of their eight children, six are now alive or they arrived at adult age, married, and have had children and grandchildren, but not a trace of phthisis has appeared in any of these ninety-Dr. Bowditch sees nothing but the in-

fluence of out-of-door life to which this immunity of his family from consumption can be attributed. He has pre-scribed it, under proper precautions, in his practice for years, and says in conclusion: 'I have no objection to drugs, properly chosen, and I almost always administer them; but if the choice were given to me to stay in the house and use medicines, or to live constantly in the pen air without them, I should infinitely prefer the latter course, in case of my being threatened with pulmonary consumption.
