A Narrow Session in the Wheat Pit for Two Reasons.

DAY'S NEWS OF A MILD CHARACTER.

Corn Rules Irregular, Narrow and Weak—Provisions Somewhat Demoralized—Cattle Fairly Active—Hogs Rather Slow.

CHICAGO April 28.—[Special Telegram to THE BEE.]—The wheat market was narrow today, the reason for this was the small number of orders. The reason for this again was found in the uncertainty and delay connected with the visible supply figures. In the absence of other important news local trade frequently demonstrated a visible report. The outside trade knows this, the report was not made final today until forty minutes before the close, when a decrease of 50,000 bushels did not cut much from the average. Early estimates range from 299,000 to 299,000 bushels decrease and the official figures came as a medium between the extremes.
