The news in the pit today came from Illinois crop figures as sent out by the agricultural bureau. They make the condition of winter wheat indicate a crop of 45, against one year ago and 75 a month ago.

Anti-Annexionists Jubilant Over Their Victory at the Polls. The anti-annexionists are jubilant and won what seemed at 4 o'clock Thursday almost a hopeless contest.

Thursday night their enthusiasm took the form of a monotonous torchlight procession that paraded up and down the streets to the music of bands. Men talked from the steps of Hunt's block and Roman candles and Chinese lanterns were on every hand to make the night resplendent.

The sentiment of the majority of South Omaha voters was decidedly opposed to annexation. It is being discouraged by wiser heads, who think the gaping sore created by the opposing factions had better be healed than widened by flaunting taunts in one another's faces.

The "anti's" were alive to the necessities of the fight and fortified themselves. Late Wednesday night a house-to-house canvass was made among the packing house employees. "No" tickets slipped the hands of the "pro's" and were quietly circulated around Armour's house, and not until the houses were either.

Police Officer John Fallon runs a boarding house in the Third ward and took a deep interest in the result. For a police officer he had a display of personal and official partisanship, very conspicuous on all occasions. He is said to have seen to it that anti-annexionists were not allowed to slip the opposition ballot into the box.

There is no new word of changing South Omaha's corporate name to some other that will leave Omaha out entirely. A bond election is being urged, too, for the purpose of raising money which to pay for some of the public improvements.

The vote Thursday is another indication of South Omaha's population. Unless all signs are wrong, the vote will contain about 75,000 people. Every voter was out and cast his ballot, and still there were 1,532 votes polled.
