RUSSIAN CENSORSHIP. The Institution and the Destruction It Has Wrought. Never before during the present reign and, old men of retentive memory add. during the present century—has that odious instition the "censure" wrought such dire destruction as at present writes a St. Petersburg correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph. Newspapers and periodicals that seemed pillars of loyalty fall down before its fateful decrees like grass before the scythe of the mower. The rare and mild expression of a questionable sentiment, or an opinion open to discussion, which one would think the government should encourage, were only to keep up appearances, is quite sufficient to wreck an old established widely circulated paper and ruin its editor. It is only a few weeks ago since the Astrakhan News collapsed-"owing to circumstances over which we have no control," explain the editors in the stereotyped phrase, consecrated by custom. which, done into every-day language, is well known to mean, acting on peremptory orders from our superiors, which we make haste to obey lest a worse fate befall us." The southern—"Yuschanm" -an insignificant little paper edited in Kherson, near Odessa, and read by three or four hundred persons of very plain

have been appropriately termed the Martyr's Cry or the Voice Crying in the Desert, but It had, as a matter of fact, a much more prosaic designation-lately informed its readers that "circum stances over which it had no control" had so affected it that the subsequent proceedings interested it no more and Siberia is now practically without an or-gan. TALMAGE'S GREAT ORGAN. Cost \$30,000.

The new organ for Talmage's tabernacle is rapidly approaching comple-tion. The first organ for the tabernacle was built in 1873, and at the time time was one of the larges and most complete in the country, says the New York World. It was destroyed with the tabernacle in 1889.

The new organ is much larger and more complete in all its details, and one of the most powerful in the world, and a veritable "king of instru-ments." It will contain four man uals of five octaves each a pedul of WAUGH & Westerfield, roal estate, S.Oma a. which will be the deep C. C. C. 32-foot

cathedral tone, the same as in the large organ in Westminster Abbey. It contains more large stops than any other organ in the country, if not the world, there being eleven stops of 16 feet and thirty-two of 8 feet. The entire number of stops is 110, of which sixty-six are pipe-stops, running through the entire scale; the rest are couplers, pneumatio combinations, tremulants and pedal movements. The total number of pipes

are 4,448 and the cost over \$30,000. The case is the open style, showing a facade of forty feet wide and fifty feet high of richly ornamented pipes. The console will be brought out ten feet in front of the organ and the wind supplied by three immense bellows, driven by a powerful electric motor on an Edson cir

Many of the stops are entirely new in this country and some are original with the builders. A new feature is the inclosing of the choir organ in a separate swell box, which, with the swell organ, will enable the organist to give very powerful and effective swell accompaniments. How German Officers Are Made. In the German army any one who aspires to become an officer enters as a volinteer, but his entry is dependent on the personal will of the captain to whose company he will be attached, says the Broad Arrow. Afterwards, when he has gone satisfactorily through tests of professional efficienthe officers of the regiment, whether present or absent, have to say individually whether they will accept him in the regiment. If they are unanimous in his favor, he will become one of them in his turn. If not unanimous, each member of the minority has to give his reasons, and it rests with the corps commander to decide the fate of the candidate. A candidate once blackballed cannot hope for entry into the army, and he returns to a man with a black mark against his name. From the foregoing remarks, it will be evident that at the present moment the future of the German army lies with the regimental offimental officers. The sumptuary regulations contained in the imperial rescript are of comparatively secondary importance; the real question before the regimental officers is, shall we give up for the good of the fatherland our pleasant social prejudices; and shall we, as our emperor him-self is doing, have in our eye the needs and necessities of our Fatherland only? The German regimental officers will, we trust, show themselves as true, as loyal, as self-denying in time of peace as they invariably have done in war, and retaining the right of free choice of their comrades, answer this momentous question in the affirma-
