No lives were reported lost, but the damage to property will amount to thousands of dollars.

It was reported that the flood had broken into Lake Manawa and swept out the dam, but an investigation proved this to be unfounded.

ARID LANDS.

The Secretary of the Interior Issues an Important Opinion. WASHINGTON, June 3.—The secretary of the interior has transmitted to the senate an opinion by the attorney general construing the act of October 2, 1888, which appropriated the sum of \$100,000 for investigating the extent to which arid land may be recovered by irrigation.
