TRIUMPH OF SURGICAL SKILL. A Woman Whose Brain Was Pierced by a Bullet Recovering.

A wonderful case is occupying the at-tention of the physicians at the city hospital here. A month ago Michael Lane assaulted his wife with a pistol

and a hammer, says a San Francisco dis-patch to the New York Star. One bullet entered her brain and another her jaw. The skull was fractured by blows four places, and the scalp on the back of her head was laid open for a distance of four inches. Having inflicted these injuries, Lane choked his wife until he thought the last breath had left her Then he leveled the murderous pistol at his own head and committed The tragedy was the sequel to a bitter

puarrel between husband and wife. The latter, on discovering that the former had drawn from the bank \$3,000—the savings of a lifetime-and lost the sum in speculation, repreached him bitterly, and he replied in the cowardly manner

But the wonder of the affair is that the woman did not die. When the surgeons reached her she was exhausted from oss of blood, and the exudation of brain matter amounted to nearly two ounces. Despite the apparent hopelessness of the case the doctors went to work, removed splinted bits of skull, cleansed the bul-let wounds, and used knife and needle with such skill that doubt gave place to hope and hope almost to certainty. great difficulty encountered-that draining and cleansing the track of the bullet through the brain-was overcome, and Mrs. Lane, instead of dying, showed

promise of ultimate recovery. After days of delirium she has become quiet and docile. There are indications that her mind will remain at least partially a blank, but her physical health may be fully regained. Mrs Lane s fifty-two years old and the mother of nine children.

Details have now reached Breslau of the accident by which forty-two-children were drowned in the Oder, near Thurze, says the Pall Mall Gazette. A number of church-goers, including about forty young girls belonging to the villages of Badziok, Siedlisk, Ruda and Thurze, were returning home from Slawikau, where they had been to recive instructions for their first communion. When they arrived at the bank of the river to be conveyed to the opposite side the fer-ryman, instead of using the weightcarrying flat ferry contented himself with the ordinary ferryboat, into which the children all crowded together so that the gunwale of the boat, which should have been thirty-five centimetres out of the water, was depressed to the water's level. Nevertheless, the boat, with its living freight, crossed to within a few yards of the opposite shore, when it suddenly capsized and sank, carrying most of the children in it to the bottom, One great shrick of horror issued from the lips of the spectators on the bank from which the boat started. They saw for a second the look of terror on children's faces; they heard their heart-rending cries; but could do nothing sava watch one little head after another disappear beneath the water.
