"The constantly unsettled condition of affairs in Union Pacific circles keeps every-body more or less agitated. There is so much accrtainty that it extends to and affects isiness interests."

It is openly stated by parties who claim to have rehable informa-tion that General Traffic Manager Mellen will be the very next man to walk the chalkine. Those who are on the inside, however, leclare they know there is no foundation for he statement. Nevertheless, recent developments look very strange.

"Why should Adams cali Tebbetts out on the road with him to talk about freight matters instead of Mellen or Munroe, unless there is something in the wind?" inquired one interested individual.


