HAD A HARD HUNT FOR TITLES, Dickens Said to Have Worked Long to Fix Names to Suit Him. Till he had fixed upon his title, Macmillan's Magazine says, Dickens could not get seriously to work. He was in Genoa in 1844, and had a Christmas story to write. He had never, he said, so stag-gered upon the threshold before. The

subject was there, but he had not found title for it, nor the machinery to work it with. Sitting down one morning resolute for work, though against the grain, his hand being out and everything inviting to idleness, such a peal of chimes arose from the city as he found 'maddening.' All Genoa lay beneath him and up from it, with some sudden set of the wind, came in one fell sound the clang and class of all its steeples, pouring into his ears again and again, in a tuneless, grating, discordant, jarring, hide-ous viabration, that made his ideas spin round and round till they lost

themselves in a whirl of vexation and giddiness and dropped down dead.'" A couple of days later he wrote to Forster a letter of one sentence. "We have heard the chimes at midnight, Master Shallow." A few days later he writes again: "It is a great thing to have my title and see my way how to work the bells. Let them clash upon me now from all the churches and convents of Genoa. I see nothing but the old London belfry I have set them in. In my mind's eye, Horatio." Thus it was always with Dickens when setting about a new novel. Despondency, doubts, difficulties, and end-less experimenting, suggesting, sifting, rejecting of titles. Then, of a sudden, a title found, and he was off on the composition of the book. Never were the

preliminary three more protracted than with "David Copperfield." Towards the end of 1848 he was making holiday at Broadstairs, his mind running on a subject. "I have not," he writes from there,

"Seen Fancy write With penell of light On the blotter so solld commanding the sea but I shouldn't wonder if she were to do it one of these days. Dim visions of divers things are floating around me. I must go to work head foremost when I get home." Home he goes, yet gets no further. In February, 1849, he is in Brighton. "A sea-fog today, but yesterday inexpressibly delicious. My mind running like a high sea on names—not satisfied yet, though." February 23 he found titles of some sort—to-wit: "Mag's Diversione; Being the Personal History of Mr. Thomas Mag the Younger of Blunderstone House." Then came a series of variations in the expository part of the title. Blunder-stone House after a time becoming Copperfield house. Then came "The Personal History of Mr. David Copperfield the Younger and His Aunt Margaret." February 26 he sent Forester a list of six names, which may be found set out at length—in the Life. Forster and Dickens' children finally determined his choice among the six, and the title once settled all is plain sailing. Ho went through this elaborate process with most of his titles. There were a dozen tentative titles for "Bleak House," most of them leading off with "Tom-All-Alone's," and fourteen for "Hard Times."

agent. AN AWFULLY FAT QUEEN. The Long-Nailed Ruler of Swaziland -

Human Sacrifices. Swaziland, in South Africa, has recently been brought to the attention of the civilized world through the visit of an English commission to the queen rerent of that country to settle the ques

tions of boundary and to arrange for a friendly understanding between the natives and whites. Usibatti, the queen regent, is enormously stout, and as a sign of exemption from any kind of labor, grows her nails, both of the hands and the feet to an ex-

treme length, says the New York Morning Journal. Her dress consists of a collection of dirty black skins and she is a constant user of snuff Although a personally good-tempered old woman, she resented with vehemence the suggestion of one of the commissioners that she abolish human sacrifices, which are quite common among the Swazies and become wholesale slaughter immediately after the death

of a member of the royal family. "Killing off," she declared, "was al-ways practiced when the nation was mourning for a deceased ruler and for the reason that it was not right that the people should in any way pretend to mourn. So that they might have good reason to weep for a ruler they perhaps had never seen, it was usual to kill off one or two of the relations of such people, and then at once their weeping became sincere. As for fair trial, the peo-ple got that, for whenever it was considered desirable that a man or two should be killed, the whole village is turned out and made to sit round in a circle; the

witch doctor then goes round and points out those that are to die." The executioner is known as Jokilibovo, or the Red Warrior. The monarch has deputed to four of the chiefs the power of sentencing to death. Should any man offend one of these, or the laws of the country, he is promptly asked to go for a walk with Jokilibovo. This walk excites very little notice among the
