MORE POLLING PLACES.

They Must be Established to Accommodate Voters on "The Island."

The erratic Missouri has in its long and useful coarse often been been necused, and sometimes justly, of offenses against good order and comfort quite inconsistent with The Goodman Drug company yesterday the majestic behavior of one of the grandest filed bills with the county clerk for furnish- waterways of the world. By its rushing the tics it has frequently deprived people of house and home, to say nothing of the lands it has flooded and made uninhabitable.

It has of late, however, turned overland in large tracts to the people and people who are voters. But the authorities have not furnished these voters with polling places within reasonable distance where votes may be recorded.

It will be remembered by many who would not claim the distinction of being "old set-tiers," that the Misseuri not so very long ago made its principal course through what is now Cut-Off lake, and thence ran west and south to a point a short distance from the Union Pacific shops. Evidently becoming tired of that circuitous route, the great river has retired east several miles from its old course and has left high and dry several square miles of territory. On this isnd, which extends from Cut-off lake south to the Union Pacific shops and north to the city of Florence many have taken up land and established homes. Others have squatted. And enterprising real estate speculators have graded and platted lands well able to accommodate thousands of others. There are, at present on this land created by the Missouri, several hundred men who are voters without

a place to vote nearer than sine miles.

An inspection of the map of the city of Omaha will disclose the fact that the east boundary of the city limits, and which is, consequently, the east line of the Fifth ward, runs a few feet east of the tracks of the Mis-souri Pacific and Fremont, Elahorn & Missouri Valley railroads, and this line extends from the Union Pacific shops north to Florence. It may also be noted that the land so vacated by the river and occupied by so many persons is accredited to Florence precinet, which is several miles away. Therefore, a person living on this land and wishing to vote at the forthcoming election would be obliged to come into the city of Omaha, walk through the Fifth ward and thence to Flor-

ace.
This difficulty might be obviated by the county board establishing a polling place at what is generally known as Cut-Off island. This polling place can only be established lawfully by a pelition of at least fifty persons living in the vicinity wishing to have a separate politing place. It is held, therefore, that the men living in the neighborhood should get the petition ready and present it to the county board at once unless they wish to be deprived of the right of franchise at this fall


