Mr. McCord of McCord, Brady & Co., who have secured control of the output of the Grand Island sugar refinery, was seen yesterday and speaking upon the sugar question said : "The first consignment from the Oxnard refinery will be received today, and although we have not seen a pound of the sugar, we have a guarantee that the quality will be equal to that from the refinery at San Francaual to that from the reinery at San Francisco. The plant will be in operation ninety days and during that time the output will reach something like sixty thousand pounds per day. But one grade of sugar will be manufactured and that will be the granulated. Our market for this Nobraska product will be throughout this state, Kansas, lowa and South Dakota.

EFFECTS OF THE WRECK.

Details Derived from a Passenger from Rock Creek. A passenger who arrived in this city dealls the completeness of the wreck on the Union Pacific near Rock Creek as was briefly

eported in these dispatches a few days ago. "The train was east bound and ran into an open switch," said he, "which a yard hand had left open. There were two engines on the train. The first ran for twenty or thirty feet on the sleepers and then took to the ditch. The secsicepers and then took to the clitch. The second engine went to the clitch almost immediately and was literally, boiler and everything, broken to pieces. There was one Wagner sleeper, one baggage and one mail car smashed into kindling wood. There were about fifty passengers on the train, and I can not absolutely see how they escaped so well, because only train bands were injured and only one of them, I believe, died.

'That was not all. Immediately east of Rock Creek station a bridge eighty feet wide, spanning the creek, was burned down about the same time. This caused a clogging of trains for miles along the road until, I believe, not less than fifty were stalled in the vicinity. Some of these were delayed for nearly two days, and comprised horses, catnearly two days, and comprised horses, cat-tle and stock of all kinds."
