District Court. County Attorney Mahoney had intended to begin the prosecution of James Reynolds, charged with murder, in Judge Clarkson's court, but, owing to the fact that there will be no court on two days of the present week, he moved that the hearing be put over until Wednesday of next week. The attorney for the defense coincided with the suggestion and the order was made.

The arguments in the Kennedy-Jonson libel suit were concluded and the case was given to the jury shortly after 3 o'clock. George Anderson began a suit against the Home fire insurance company to recover \$800. His grocery store was burned June 22, but he was unable to recover on his policy.

Robert W. Phelps sues B. Boyle & Co., saloon keepers, for \$4,750 damages on account of his physical inability to labor. Phelps is a plasterer. In his petition he relates that on the 30th day of September he was waylaid, slugged and sandbagged by two men named White and Gillan, who were under the influence of liquor sold them by the defendants. That White and Gillan are minors and that, since the assault, he has been unable to work at his trade and is today a physical wreck as the result of his wounds.

John S. Mullen will be tried before Judge Clarkson Wednesday for resisting a police officer in South Omaha. In Judge Hopewell's court the case of William A. Cochrin as assignee of the Bank of Omaha against James A. Brown was put on trial and judgment in the sum of \$3,732 rendered in favor of the plaintiff.

Before adjourning last night, the judges of the district court pronounced from the respective benches that in order to pay tribute to the memory of the late Judge Savage, none of the courts would be in session today.

After Clerk Moore had read his journal yesterday morning, Judge Wakeley announced that there would be a meeting of the members of the Douglas county bar association in Judge Clarkson's court room at 12 o'clock to memorialize on the death of the late Hon. James W. Savage.

At the hour mentioned, a large number of attorneys put in an appearance. Hon. A. J. Poppleton presided and Mr. Clapp was elected secretary pro tem. The chair stated that, in his opinion, the proper thing to do would be to name a committee to adopt resolutions which could be spread upon the journal of the association.

Mr. E. W. Simeral then moved that a committee of nine be appointed on resolutions and another committee of three be named to select a floral arrangement in the name of the Douglas county bar association. The chairman then selected the following gentlemen to draft appropriate resolutions: Messrs. John L. Kelley, G. B. Hawley, W. R. Kelley, B. E. B. Kennedy, E. W. Simeral, Charles Ogden, M. V. Gannon and W. F. Gurley.

Messrs. C. J. Smyth, Leo Estelle and W. D. McHugh were instructed to select the floral offering. Mr. Gurley moved that the members of the bar association and all other attorneys who desired to attend the funeral, meet at the court house at 12:30 o'clock and proceed in a body at least to the residence of the deceased. This suggestion met with the approval of all present.

The chair then spoke of a memorial meeting to which he thought should take place at a convenient time within the next two weeks. The committee named by Judge Wakeley to draft resolutions for the bar as a whole consists of George E. Pritchett, A. J. Poppleton, John D. Howe, L. E. Congdon and John C. Cowin. This committee will meet at Mr. Pritchett's office this evening.

There will be a memorial meeting of the members of the bar in Judge Clarkson's court on Saturday. The funeral of Judge Savage will take place this afternoon at 1 o'clock from his late residence, 412 North Twenty-second street. Loyal Legion.
