

A NEW TEMPLE OF WORSHIP.

Dedication of the First United Presbyterian Church. Another decided step in the onward march of Christian work in Omaha was celebrated yesterday by the dedication of the First United Presbyterian church at the corner of Twenty-first and Emmet streets, in Kountze place.

The church, a full description of which appeared in The Sunday Bee, is one of the most attractive and convenient among the smaller houses of worship in Omaha, and it was filled to its utmost capacity at the morning service by members and friends of the congregation. The sermon was preached by Rev. J. T. McHenry, of Pittsburg.

It was both eloquent and spiritual. He chose as a text the seventeenth verse of the twenty-eighth chapter of Genesis: "This is none other but the house of God, and this is the gate of heaven." The address was interesting, and was evidently of such a nature as to furnish food for reflection for many days.

The responsive reading was concluded by the pastor, Rev. John M. French, and was entered into by the audience very earnestly. The music was furnished by a chorus choir of thirty voices and was both appropriate and effective.

At 3:30 p. m. there was a fraternal meeting, in which Rev. Laird of the Knox Presbyterian, Rev. Foster of the Emmanuel Baptist, Rev. Merrill of the First Methodist, Rev. Thain of the Plymouth Congregational and Rev. Kuhns of the Lutheran church, took part. Short, interesting addresses were made by each, and a general conference was held, which prevailed in the meeting. Rev. Bean of the Trinity Methodist church was also present.

Rev. McGroarty preached in the evening and drew a very large audience of well pleased people. The membership of the First United Presbyterian church numbers about two hundred, and the church is free from debt. The future of this church is certainly very bright, and it is very safe to predict that its field of usefulness will not only be widened but will be thoroughly cultivated by the energetic pastor and his zealous flock.

NEBRASKA'S NEEDY FARMERS. Result of a Canvass by Precincts in Red Willow County.

The county commissioners of Red Willow county had a meeting to which all the justices of the peace in the county were invited. The objects of the meeting were to learn the extent to which aid would be needed by the people of the county, and to form an organization to receive and disburse the goods shipped in from the eastern part of the state. A call of precincts was made, answers to which were as follows:

Boaver precinct—We have about sixty-four families. Eleven of these are able to provide for themselves. Twenty were able to provide food for themselves, but all would need aid in the way of food for stock and seed in the spring.

Box Elder precinct—Thirty-eight families are asking for sustenance for themselves and work horses. To enable them to stay and work until next harvest there will be needed 250 bushels of corn, 250 bushels of oats, 100 bushels of potatoes, 17,000 pounds of flour and not less than thirty-eight tons of coal. A great many of these families will need aid within the next ten days.

Grover precinct—Six or seven families need help immediately. There are but few families but will need help. Indiana precinct—There are twenty-five families who will need help at once. Three times that many will need help before spring. Similar responses were given from all the precincts in the county. Inquiry revealed the fact that the only fuel now used (cow chips) was nearly exhausted, and, even if plenty, not adequate to keep a family warm in winter. From five hundred to eight hundred families will need to be furnished with coal. Three carloads have been distributed in small lots, but if a blizzard should come it would find two-thirds of the farmers without fuel.

Hebrew Emigration Society. The second monthly meeting of the Hebrew emigration relief association was held yesterday afternoon at the synagogue on Capitol avenue near Twelfth street. This society was organized a month ago for the purpose of assisting Hebrew emigrants. The officers elected were as follows: J. Bernstein, president; J. D. Nathanson, vice president; L. Kencels, treasurer; L. Slobodsky, secretary; E. Fleischmann, H. Freeman, and B. Simon, trustees; J. Simon, L. Kettin, B. Weisman, board of trustees.

The meeting yesterday was a brief one, and the principal subject of discussion was the advisability of joining the Hebrew alliance, recently organized in Philadelphia, for the purpose of extending systematic relief to the large number of Hebrews who come to the United States, especially those from Russia, most of whom are entirely destitute when they arrive in this country. No definite action was taken on this proposition.
