Mr. Morgan offered a preamble and con current resolution on the subject of recent proceedings in the supreme court in connec tion with the Behring sea dispute. The resolution declares such proceeding without precedent, prejudicial to the comity of nations and to the usual and amicable conduct of international relations and not in consonance with the dignity of the government and the people or with the respect due to the president of the United States. Referred. The elections bill was taken up and Mr. Evarts spoke at length in advocacy of it. He particularly scored the new constitution of

Mississippi in so far as it related to elections and suffrage. Mr. Pasco obtained the floor and the bill was laid aside informally.

Mr. Hoar gave notice that tomorrow he should ask the senate to remain in session until the bill was finished. Adjourned.
